

These remarks are made in no fault finding spirit, which God forbid, but as kindly criticisms of a very valuable lecture from which much good may be expected. Apologetics, as students know, is a large subject, and may be made as dull as it is vast. Mr Mowat is far from dull, and so will every one be who regards Christian Evidences as an active instrument for leading men into, and keeping them within, the Church.
