CUSTOMS TARIFF AMENDMENT

The house in committee of ways and means, Mr. Hanson (York-Sunbury) in the chair.

1. Resolved, that schedule A to the customs tariff, being chapter forty-four of the revised statutes of Canada, 1927, as amended by chapter seventeen of the acts of 1928, chapter thirty-nine of the acts of 1929, chapter thirteen of the acts of 1930 (first session), chapter three of the acts of 1930 (second session) and chapter thirty of the acts of 1931, be further amended by striking thereout tariff item 409q, the several enumerations of goods, respectively, and the several rates of duties of customs, if any, set opposite thereto, and by inserting the following item, enumerations and rates of duty in said schedule A:

FISH INSPECTION ACT

Hon. ALFRED DURANLEAU (Acting Minister of Fisheries) moved the third reading of Bill No. 6, to amend the Fish Inspection Act.

Motion agreed to and bill read the third time and passed.

FRONTIER COLLEGE ACT

Hon. C. H. CAHAN (Secretary of State) moved the second reading of Bill No. 53, to amend the act of incorporation of the Frontier College.

Motion agreed to, bill read the second time, and the house went into committee thereon, Mr. Hanson (York-Sunbury) in the chair.

On section 1—Power to confer degrees.

Mr. STEWART (Edmonton): Would the minister explain the bill?

Mr. CAHAN: In the year 1922 parliament passed an act to incorporate the Frontier College, by chapter 77 of the statutes of that year. The objects of this college were defined in section six of the statute, as follows:

(a) To promote education among Canadian working men and women and Canadian immigrants; (b) To promote higher educational training and instruction for teachers and social workers among Canadian working men and women and Canadian immigrants.

The objects were very praiseworthy indeed, but under section ten of the act the college was authorized to confer degrees. The college has recently applied to the government of the province of Ontario to be brought under the operation of the Education Act of Ontario and to secure certain
