1. Since its inception, how many wells have been drilled by Panarctic Oils Limited in Canada's north and, in each case, where were these wells located?

DEBT OWED BY CEYLON TO CANADA

Question No. 280—**Mr. Robinson:**

What debt, if any, is owed by Ceylon to Canada and what are the terms of repayment?

Mr. André Ouellet (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State for External Affairs): The answer in so far as CIDA is concerned, is \$11,000,000 comprised of nine development loans. Two development loans amounting to \$2,500,000 have a repayment period of 50 years with a grace period of ten years and a service and commitment charge of $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1 per cent. The remaining seven loans amounting to \$8,500,000 have a repayment period of 50 years, a grace period of ten years and an interest rate of 0 per cent.

1. Does Mr. S. Siddiqi work for the Department of Supply and Services and, if so, in what position?
2. What are the responsibilities and functions of Mr. Siddiqi's position?
3. When did Mr. Siddiqi join the Department?
4. Has Mr. Siddiqi been seconded on loan for nine months to the Air Industries Association of Canada and, if so, who is paying Mr. Siddiqi's salary during that period of time?

2. What wells have been abandoned by Panarctic, and at what depths?

3. What is the estimated expenditure in the above well-drilling projects?

Mr. Judd Buchanan (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): 1 and 2.

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of Supply and Services): 1. Yes. Project Officer, Shipbuilding and Heavy Equipment Branch.

2. Procurement of technically complex systems, products and services with duties requiring the conduct of all phases of the purchasing cycle, including planning, facility and bid evaluations, contract negotiations and document control and related administration.

3. July 24, 1967.

4. Yes. Mr. Siddiqi's salary is paid by the Department of Supply and Services and the full amount is recovered from the Air Industries Association of Canada. The loan of Mr. Siddiqi to the Association is in keeping with the Government's policy of interchange of Government employees with personnel from the private sector.

DEBT OWED BY JAMAICA TO CANADA

Question No. 329—**Mr. Fortin:**

How much does Jamaica owe Canada and what are the repayment terms?

[Translation]

Mr. André Ouellet (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State for External Affairs): In so far as CIDA is concerned, the answer is: \$10,000,000 comprised of thirteen development loans. Eight loans amounting to \$5,475,000 have a maturity of fifty years, a grace period of ten years and a service and commitment charge of $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1 per cent. Four loans totalling \$4,025,000 have a maturity of thirty years, a grace period of seven years and an interest rate of 3 per cent. The last remaining loan in the amount of \$500,000 has a maturity of twenty-
