SUBSIDY ON DOMESTICALLY CONSUMED WHEAT—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Steven E. Paproski (Edmonton Centre): Mr. Speaker, I rise, under the provisions of Standing Order 43, on a matter of urgent and pressing necessity.

In view of the fact that the CPI released today shows an annual rate of inflation of 8.8 per cent, a situation that will get worse as we get into the winter months, with prices increasing in bread, pasta and produce, a fact which will weigh heavily on fixed and low income earners who have to spend a disproportionate amount of their income on food, I move, seconded by the hon. member for St. John's East (Mr. McGrath):

That the government's consumer subsidy on domestically consumed wheat be phased out over a period of three years, in order to minimize its impact on bread and pasta prices which will increase anywhere from 16 per cent to 20 per cent as of January 1.

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AIR TRANSPORT

ALLEGED VIOLATIONS OF AERONAUTICAL COMMUNICATIONS STANDARDS AND PROCEDURES ORDER—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Elmer M. MacKay (Central Nova): Mr. Speaker, I rise on a matter of urgent and pressing necessity pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 43.

My motion is with regard to an important air navigation order known as the Aeronautical Communications Standards and Procedures Order relating to air safety and the Official Languages Act. After attempting for six weeks to get a report on this ANO, the minister informed me in writing on December 11 that for the period November 25, 1976, to July 23, 1978, 10,228 incidents of alleged violations of the order were reported.

I therefore move, seconded by the hon. member for Dartmouth-Halifax East (Mr. Forrestall):

That the Minister of Transport, on motions, explain to the House how this apparently irregular situation developed; what, if anything, is going to be done about the 10,000 plus incidents of alleged violations of the order and explain how he reconciles the development of this type of situation with his own duties and responsibilities under section 3(a) of the Aeronautics Act.

CROWSNEST PASS RATES—MEETING WITH SASKATCHEWAN— MOTION UNDER S.O. 43
