judging from recent reports, it is unlikely that we will see one. The government's lack of commitment to reforestation in this country is shameful. It has still not renewed the forestry agreement with the province of Ontario.

In 1985, more than \$75 million was spent by the federal government over four years to regenerate our forests in northern Ontario. Now it appears that Ontario's forests will get a small slice of the \$40 million this government has offered for regional development.

This government has stalled long enough. It is time for it to make a real commitment to regional development and to our forests. I urge the government to renew the Canada–Ontario Forest Resource Agreement immediately and to provide the necessary funding to get the job done. It is time the government put its money where its mouth is.

# TRANS-CANADA HIGHWAY

Mr. Greg Thompson (Carleton-Charlotte): Mr. Speaker, yesterday the Premier of New Brunswick announced the expansion of the Trans-Canada Highway.

As we all realize, the future prosperity of New Brunswick depends upon a good transportation system. Confidence in the economic future of my province is on the rise, and yesterday's announcement clearly indicates this confidence and, yes, confidence in where we as a nation are going.
