ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE

Mr. Jack Whittaker (Okanagan—Similkameen—Merritt): Mr. Speaker, it is my pleasure to rise under Standing Order 36 to present a petition on behalf of various people in British Columbia.

The concern here is that the federal government is either cutting back on policing or adding additional cost to the tax base of municipalities to come up with extra money for policing.

These people in British Columbia have stated that the federal government is uncompromising in its negotiations with its provincial counterparts by maintaining that their share of funding will be reduced as of March 31, 1991, resulting in additional cost to the taxpayers and municipalities.

The petitioners are urging the government to consider restoring proper funding to the RCMP so that it will fulfil its mandate and role as the only visible police force for communities across British Columbia and remain as a viable symbol of Canadian unity.
