When work is started in the fields in the morning, there is a man with a four-horse team running the digger. He belongs to the neighborhood, so he doesn't count. Then comes a line-up of twelve to sixteen pickers. One family is working, father, mother, daughter and a half-grown boy. They will stay all day, heat or no heat. They belong to the valley.

Next in reliability are the hoboes. They live out of doors. They don't work very many days in the year and they don't seem to suffer from the heat. 
