

DESERTED HER BABY AT UNION STATION

Eighteen-Year-Old Woman
Left Boy in Arms of Mrs.
Jeffries

ACCOMPANIED BY MAN

Couple Said by Traveler to
Have Boarded Train and
Left City.

Stepping from a train at the Union Station at 12.30 yesterday afternoon a woman about 18 years old, five feet six inches in height, blonde hair, wearing a brown raincoat, brown sweater and a brown hat, handed a nine-month-old baby boy to Mrs. Jeffries, 473 Dupont street, who was standing near to hold, stating that she wanted to purchase a ticket. After a time Mrs. Jeffries became suspicious and notified the police. The baby was given in charge of Miss Levitt of the morality department, who took it to the infants' home.

The woman was accompanied by a man five feet six inches in height, about 25 years of age, dark complexion, clean shaven and wearing a gray overcoat and black christie hat.

The couple are said by a traveler to have boarded the train between Eastwood and Hamilton. The baby was found in blue frock and a white fur coat. A box full of baby clothing was left behind by the woman.

The officers of the morality department are investigating the matter and will be glad to receive information which will lead to the arrest of the pair.

Church Hymnal.

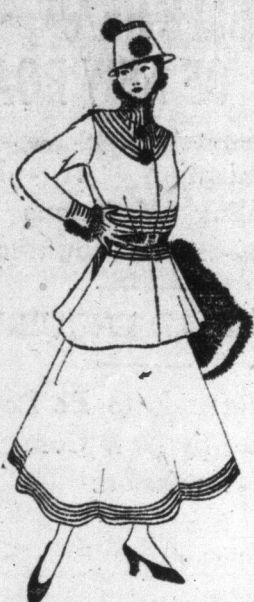

WILL GIVE PREFERENCE TO RETURNED SOLDIERS

Many Manufacturers Respond to
Request Sent Out by
Commission.

The Soldiers' Aid Commission yesterday inaugurated an outside branch, consisting of three members, whose duty it will be practically to canvass manufacturers and others for jobs for returned soldiers. Major Curran and two returned soldiers have been appointed to do the work, and it is expected that they will answer advertisements for jobs for returned soldiers. As a result of this decision the following notice has been posted in the liquor stores of Toronto under date of November 19:

"To wine and spirit merchants of Toronto: Take notice, you are hereby notified that the giving of liquor away has been interpreted to come within the meaning of the license law as unlawful encouragement and solicitation of trade. Therefore the practice of giving liquor as a premium or in holiday season as a present must be discontinued forthwith.

"Disobedience to this order will lead to serious trouble for offenders. By order of the Executive Committee Licensed Wine and Spirit Shop Association."

MAIL ORDERS WILL BE FILLED

PRESENTS OF LIQUOR BANNED BY SHOPMEN

Executive of Association Issues
Imperative Order to Members
Regarding Practice.

There will be no free gifts of liquor this Christmas. All the Toronto shopkeepers have signed a petition which has been forwarded to the Ontario Licensing Board to the effect that this Christmas they will discontinue their practice of sending little presents to their friends.

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The Simcoe Club, Toronto, and the Windsor Club, Windsor, have announced their intention to cut off the distribution of liquor after 8 o'clock.

BIG DAMAGE ACTION DISMISSED WITH COSTS

In the non-jury assize court yesterday afternoon, Justice Maaten dismissed with costs the action brought by George Vainour on behalf of Ruth Vainour, 12 years of age, who it is alleged, sustained permanent injuries thru falling down the stairs in Church Street School. Plaintiffs asked for \$10,000 damages against the board of education for alleged negligence in allowing the floors to be in a slippery condition.

Counsel for the plaintiff endeavored to get an adjournment of the case, pleading that his client was in New York under the care of a doctor. The case has been hanging for over a year and will likely be placed again on the peremptory list for trial at some future date.

GOT MORPHINE BY FRAUD.

Charged with obtaining one ounce of morphine by fraud from the Drug Trading Company, Leo McNicholl was fined \$10 and costs in the police court yesterday. A clerk from the company stated that first a telephone order was sent for the drug and that McNicholl appeared afterwards for the drug, saying it was for a Mr. Kipp, a druggist. The order was made out, but before being handed over Mr. Kipp denied the telephone order and had sent for it. McNicholl is said to have left the store with the drug when the clerk was telephoning and had placed more than enough money on the counter to pay for it.

MIGHT REGULATE PHYSICIANS' FEES

Commissioner Hodgins Made Sug-
gestion at Session of Ontario
Medical Commission.

H. S. Osler, K.C., speaking before the Ontario Medical Commission yesterday, declared that the famous Christian Scientist case, King v. Stewart, is the one which first gave the drugless healers their foothold in Ontario.

Mr. Osler said the College of Physicians and Surgeons had unsuccessfully fought the case thru the Ontario courts.

"The commission is getting well along with its hearings and soon it will have all the evidence necessary on which to make a finding. Two weeks from today the commission will again sit to hear the joint case of the College of Physicians and Surgeons and the University of Toronto."

"I am not entering into any argument with other healers. The time may come when the universities may have to admit to the drugless men that they were right. But we believe a man who specializes on these lines should do so knowingly and not ignorantly," argued Mr. Osler for the physicians.

"The system of allowing the sale of patent medicines without clear notice is wrong," he argued.

"But a great many of them are recommended by the physicians," returned the commissioner.

Commissioner Hodgins started the court with a suggestion that doctors, too, might be regulated in the matter of charges. "There is nothing to prevent a doctor charging as much as he likes," he said.

INSPECTOR COWLEY WITHIN HIS RIGHTS

Statute Permitted Exclusion of
Information From His
Annual Report.

In defence of the exclusion from the annual report of the board of education of certain information regarding conditions in the public schools of the city, as furnished by the various inspectors, and to which attention was drawn by the "white paper" recently published by the bureau of municipal research, it is pointed out that Chief Inspector Cowley was quite within his rights in withholding all or any of the information referred to. The statute says that in reporting to the government or the board of education the chief inspector shall "report in such detail as he may deem expedient" the information furnished by the schools.

Asked if it would publish the information called for Chief Inspector Cowley said that the answer to that question would have to come from the board of education.
