What City's Charitable Organizations Will Do To-day in Way of Distribution.

Meat... 3,000 lbs. Poultry... 1,200 lbs. Tea... 1,750 lbs. Candy... 300 lbs. Bread... 8,000 loaves. Potatoes... 200 sacks. Number of families aided, 800. The above is in part the amount of Christmas cheer which will be given away by the various charitable organizations to the needy poor of the city to-day. Six hundred families, who are suffering, will be made happy on Christmas Day by the work of the societies and private individuals. Besides providing the Christmas dinner many of the organizations give cash to the deserving, that they may be housed and warmed, pay lodging and board for immigrants, supply fuel to the very indigent and alleviate distress of any kind.

At the Salvation Army Training School on Sherbourne-street the staff of the British Empire League, who were very busy last night preparing three hundred baskets—provisions for 1700 people. Each basket contained a loaf of bread, a joint of beef, one-half lb. of tea, one-half lb. sugar, a loaf of butter and a tin of soup. This afternoon they will be delivered by special messengers to the homes of the destitute, who have been visited and cared for by the officers. At several of the branches clothing being distributed by the various committees.

The paid up capital is \$1,500,000 of common stock.
