Under the first classification, the ground shall be adultery, bigamy conviction and sentence for crime fol lowed by two years' continuous im prisonment; extreme cruelty; desertion, and habitual drunkenness for two years. The same causes will prevail in the second-class with the additional cause of "hopeless insanity of the husband."

No divorce shall be granted if it appears to the satisfaction of the court that the suit has been brought by col-lusion or that the plaintiff has secured or connived at the offence charged, or has condoned it, or has been guilty of adultery not condoned.
