WHEAT GOES STILL LOWER.

Marked Slump in Liverpool Yesterday.

Continental Prices Also Lower—Decrease in World's Visible Supply—Crop News—Corn, Oats and Provisions—Toronto Stocks—Consolidated.

Tuesday Evening, June 14.

Wheat showed further weakness to-day, but there is a feeling in some quarters that, despite the crop prospects, prices have touched the bottom and are likely to be able to straighten out his affairs without the aid of a trustee or the interference of the courts. He says that the Chicago trade will be taken care of, the cash wheat business will be protected, and that the market is said to be in a state of equilibrium.

On the Chicago board, futures fell 1c to 3c to-day, but at the close July wheat showed a loss of only 1/2c for the day, September a loss of 1/2c, and December a loss of 1/2c.

Cables say that the collapse of the Letter carrier caused a panic in the Liverpool market. Many, however, received the news with equanimity, in the belief that the "plunging operator" out of it, the English market will need a good deal of support.

English newspapers rejoice at Letter's reported smash. At Liverpool, spot closed 6d per bushel, 18s 6d for July, 18s 6d for September 14 and December 14 lower. Flour declined 2s 6d on that market.

At Paris, wheat-to-day dropped 45 centimes to 1 franc, and flour 75 to 80 centimes.

Canadian markets show increasing weakness. Shippers are beginning to be uneasy about drafts sent forward for grain already afloat, some of which may not arrive until the end of the month.

On the Toronto board, Ontario red sold at 87c, middle freight, white, 87c; hard, 87c; soft, 87c.

On the Chicago board, provisions closed strong, partly owing to favorable yellow fever news.

Receipts at New York to-day: Flour, 5147 bbls. and 6538 sacks; wheat, 355,337 bushels.

The stocks of wheat at Port William and Port Arthur are 568,404 bushels, as against 420,318 bushels a week ago and 1,694,442 bushels a year ago.

Receipts of wheat at Liverpool the past three days were 275,000 bushels, of which 104,000 bushels were American, a year ago, 343,000 bushels.

Live stock receipts at Chicago to-day: Cattle, 2000; sheep, 10,300; hogs, 15,000.

Live stock receipts at Toronto to-day: Cattle, 1000; sheep, 200; hogs, 1800; calves, 50.

The World's Visible.

According to Bradstreet's, the visible supply of wheat out of the Rockies has since a week ago decreased 3,405,000 bushels, while the visible supply in Europe and the world's visible during the week decreased 2,900,000 bushels, as against an increase in the same week last year of 3,100,000 bushels. The visible supply of corn increased 770,000 bushels during the week, and that of oats 104,000 bushels.
