LABOR UNIONS PROTEST

Continued From Page 1.

William Mulock replied at length to the deputation. Sir William recognized the fact that the country was in a state of industrial depression, and the importance of the country to the well-being of the industrial classes. He thought, however, that many schemes were often presented that would not achieve the end desired. The duty of the government was to examine the facts and pick out the best route to prosperity for industrial classes. The suggested anti-trust law was an entirely new bit of legislation, but he recognized the principle in the present Alien Labor Act. The old act was drawn to meet the special conditions in the United States.

Don't Like Penal Venture.
The suggestion that it be made a penal offense for anyone in Canada to secure immigration into Canada under contract for foreign countries, would have a far-reaching effect. It was an axiom that the welfare of Canada depended upon the welfare of Canadian farmers. Lands in the west were being taken up freely, and there was room for millions of people. Farmers in Canada could not find enough laborers in Canada, but had to go to the Old Land, yet the suggested act would make it certain for Ontario farmers to send to England or other countries for help. This was the crucial point and had been lost sight of.

Other View of the Law.
To carry such an act out would be to hit the farmer that had the golden egg. Then, again, what would the people of England think? It would be a penal offense for English settlers in Canada to send home for their friends to come out and assist in the building up of Canada. It would check immigration to Canada.

A similar idea to the one suggested had been floated on Australia, and the now industrial life was greatly depressed there. Australia was locked up for those who lived there. In his mind, the end aimed at could be better attained by wiser means.

What was that end? The uplifting of the industrial classes, giving them better wages and more comforts. This could not be obtained by extreme methods. It was imperative to have friction between employer and employee. This idea he had in view when he pressed his conciliation act in 1900.

Not a Wise Move.
If intervention on the part of the Minister of Labor was permitted on the invitation of either party to a dispute, how would it work out? It would make intervention compulsory when it would not be wise and would not occur at the proper psychological moment. He deprecates amendments to the present alien law.

It was true that he was legislating against railways in a special way, but it was because the general public was the party interested in the running of railways. Such public interest did not arise in disputes between private citizens. He had thought of introducing a permissive act making it possible for companies and employees to register if they are willing to have the Minister of Labor interfere in times of strikes. This was only a suggestion. He threw it out so that it might be debated at meetings of the congress, and if approved of might be carried out.

May Have Weekly Pay Days.
He considered there was much merit in the system of paying weekly. It was a hardship to the low-priced worker to have to wait four weeks for their money. He promised to look into the grievances of the Cornish Indians, but opposed the idea that legislation should be passed against the importation of Japanese. Sir Wilfrid said the \$300 poll tax practically shut out the Chinese. That was far enough to go. Japan was friendly to Canada, and had a trade to obtain.

He promised to send blue books to all local trades unions. He declined to answer a further question, declaring that the government's view were well known. He agreed to apply the fair wage scale to all government contracts hereafter. He thought the views of the longshoremen of St. John should be brought up by itself.

Plea of Letter Carriers.
Referring at length to the plea of the letter carriers, Sir Wilfrid said that under the old law, before he took hold of the Postoffice Department, the letter carriers attained a maximum of \$240 in nine years, and he had changed that and made it possible for the maximum to be reached in a little over four years. A man was entered as a probationary for a short time, and then if fit, made a permanent employee. But, within four years, he could attain to \$446 a year. Letter carriers were paid \$2 a day for 313 days in the year, and given two weeks' holidays, for which they were paid. Besides, if their conduct was satisfactory, they got a bonus of \$20 a year. Further, they were provided with uniforms amounting to \$30 or \$40 a year. Of course, things had changed since then, but that was due only to the higher cost of living. He thought the letter carriers were getting on well in Canada. It was a strange fact in view of the grievances presented, that he was flooded with applications to get into the service.

W. J. Douglas: Do you make any allowance for sick men?
Sir Wilfrid replied that he did not. He had tried it and found it unsatisfactory. If a man worked on holidays or Sundays extra time for a few hours he was paid a full day's pay.

Took Advantage of Privilege.
He would not recede from the position that he could not pay letter carriers when sick. He inferred that the privilege had been taken advantage of, and he would like to see a bill to register it had been passed in the House twice, but had been killed by the Senate.
