Before the opening the fact that Liverpool's opening cables quoted unchanged prices steadied the curb, but when regular trading began there was a steady selling movement inaugurated and prices sank under the pressure. The items to which the greatest importance as bear factors was attached were the large world's shipments for the week (9,600,000 bu), heavy northwestern receipts (1,259 cars, against 983 last Monday and 1,268 a year ago), and an increase in the amount of wheat on ocean passage of 1,200,000 bu. Later the depression became more pronounced on an increase in the visible supply of 1,085,010 bu. The bulge, which came at the close, was due to reported damage to the Argentine crop and to further sales of cash wheat for shipment to Australia. Closing Liverpool cables were weak and 21d to 21d lower. Berlin and Paris were also lower, whilst Antwerp was unchanged to slightly higer. December wheat opened from 79c to 784c, declined to 774c, closing at 784c—1c under Saturday. Cash wheat was weak, and 1c to 1c lower. Corn was a shade lower for May and 1c to 1c lower for cash. Young Geo. Vick Found On the Rails Near Conneaut.

Left Home On Aug. 3 and Was Only Heard of Once Afterwards.

Mr. Richard Vick, caretaker of Robinson Hall Chambers, has received who left here on Aug. 3 last. Since that time Mr. Vick has been anxiously communicating with the different police officials all over the country for some news of his son. "Your letter of Oct. 12 to the station form you that on Aug. 26, about 5 a. m., an unknown man was found on our track three and three-quarter miles east of Conneaut, Ohio, badly injured, and in an unconscious condition. The young man was taken to Conneaut, Ohio, and given in charge of the city authorities. He lived about three hours, dying at 8 a.m. The description furnished by the coroner corresponds with the young man you have described. On his left arm was

tattooed an anchor and the letters 'G. E. V.'" Mr. Vick is almost broken-hearted, and has no doubt that the boy met a tragic death. He was enticed away from home to see the races at Detroit, and then fell in with company who encouraged him to go away with

Mr. Vick has had a presentiment for for some time that his son had met with some castrophe, as he received no word from him. Mr. Vick has written the authorities at Conneaut, and it is likely the remains will be Mr. and Mrs. Vick have been sadly
