Forty Degrees Below Zero!

Colorado, Kansas, Wisconsin and Wyoming

Visited by an intensely Cold Wave—Blizzards and a Sixty-Miles-an-Hour Gale Make It Interesting for the Western People.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 30.—Specials from points in the interior of Wisconsin report very low temperature. At Appleton the thermometer recorded 35 degrees below zero, the coldest yet.

Wichita, Kansas, Jan. 30.—Snow began falling today, accompanied by fierce wind. A severe blizzard extends over Southern Kansas and Oklahoma.

Rawlins, Wyo., Jan. 30.—A terrible blizzard has been raging in Rawlins county. With the wind blowing 50 miles an hour, the snow has drifted badly. The storm will be severe on stock, as the snow is crusty, preventing sheep from securing food.

Denver, Col., Jan. 30.—Snow began falling on the mountains shortly after midnight last night, and the storm which has been raging since a week ago, with an occasional let up, is again in full blast. The town of Breckenridge, about 40 miles from Leadville, is completely isolated. Fuel and provisions are getting low, and much suffering from the lack of necessities must result. Not a wheel has moved out of Como, on the South Park, for two days, and reports from there tell of great losses to range stock.

Mines shut down. The mines about Leadville have been forced to close down, as no ore can be moved. Hundreds of men have worked almost incessantly at different points on the South Park line between Como and Leadville to open the road to traffic, but have at last been compelled to give it up. Snow is packed in great drifts in the cuts and the winds piled it in as fast as the shovellers can make an opening.

No trains running. Kokomo is almost hidden away by the banks of snow on all sides. Snowdrifts are frequent and destruction threatens the town. No trains have moved west of Leadville on the Colorado Midland for several days. Should the storm keep up its present fury, great suffering and loss of life will result. The storm extends along the mountains in Wyoming and already the loss to cattle has been great.

CONFUSING AND MENACING

French Government's Decision in the Dreyfus Case.

Thought by Some It Will Produce a Constitutional Crisis.

El Obied, the Dervishes' Last Stronghold, Besieged.

Fourteen Persons Killed in a Mine Near Mazarron, Spain.

The Franco-Italian Treaty Approved by the Legislature at Rome—Duke and Duchess of Cognatch Visit the Pope.

Paris, Jan. 30.—The government's decision to submit to the chamber of deputies a bill providing that cases of trial shall be brought before the united sections of the court of cassation has reopened the flood gates of the Dreyfus agitation. The situation appears more confusing and menacing than ever.

For days the anti-Dreyfusites have been clamoring to have the case referred to the united sections, because they have considered it certain that among more than 30 judges they could rely upon an anti-Dreyfusite majority.

In the Echo De Paris, M. Quesnay de Beaupaire again justifies his resignation from the court of cassation in a screaming screed and asserts that the ministers hold a decisive document; while M. Coope and Jules Lemaître have signed a manifesto on behalf of the organization known as La Patrie Francaise, claiming credit for urging the government to take its present course and declaring that if the Dreyfus affair be once submitted to this truly supreme tribunal it will receive such a solution as will insure the country's repose.

M. Leow, president of the criminal chamber, who was asked his opinion regarding the government's proposal, said: "I am glad to be relieved of the responsibility, but the government's action is revolutionary."

The anti-revisionist papers are jubilant; but the most serious and impartial journals deprecate the government's weakness.

WILL NOT BE SATISFACTORY. M. De Biowitz, the Paris correspondent of the London Times, commenting upon the "state of anarchy and revolution" which the government's yielding to outdoor pressure bespeaks, predicts that the bill will fail to stand serious discussion, and says that, like all concessions to clamor, it will satisfy nobody.

DERVISHES CORNERED. Orduzman, Jan. 30.—Col. Kitchener, brother of the sirdar, with a strong Egyptian force, is besieging El Obied, the last stronghold of the dervishes in the Soudan. The Khalifa, who fled after his defeat by the sirdar, is now reported to be at Sherikia, eighty miles south of El Obied, trying to collect an army among his faithful Baggara to march to the relief of the besieged town. The sirdar plans are for an immediate reconquest of the Koroforah and Darfur regions that are still in the hands of the dervishes.

FOURTEEN KILLED. Murcia, Spain, Jan. 30.—Fourteen persons were killed yesterday by an explosion of gas in the Palla mine, near Mazarron, 20 miles west of Cartagena. The other miners succeeded in making their escape.

ARCHBISHOP IRELAND IN ROME. Rome, Jan. 30.—Archbishop Ireland went to the Vatican yesterday, where he had a conference with Cardinal Rampoldi, papal secretary of state. Many cardinals and other high ecclesiastics visited the archbishop at the Hotel Bristol, where he was staying. In the course of an interview he declared that there was absolutely no foundation for the statement that he had been charged to represent the United States at the forthcoming conference regarding the limitation of armaments. The United States, he said, had not yet nominated a delegate.

The archbishop was very reserved in his replies to questions respecting religious questions in America, on the ground that it was necessary for him to wait for the holy see to pass upon such matters.

A WOMAN IN THE CASE. London, Jan. 30.—Lloyd's Weekly newspaper states that it is known to the police and bank authorities that none of the notes stolen from Parr's Bank recently have gone far out of London, and that this is also reason to believe that the letter accompanying the notes returned to the bank was written by a woman.

VISITED THE POPE. Rome, Jan. 30.—The Duke and Duchess of Cognatch were received by the pope on Saturday. They drove from the British embassy to the Vatican in state, and the highest formalities were observed upon their arrival at the papal palace. The duke wore the uniform of a general of the British army. The audience lasted half an hour, and after leaving the presence of the pope the duke and duchess called on Cardinal Rampoldi, the papal secretary of state.

THE CORTES. Madrid, Jan. 30.—The reopening of the cortes is fixed for Feb. 20. The government will introduce a bill providing for the payment of indemnity to Spaniards who have suffered through the cession of the Philippines to the United States. The premier will submit to the queen regent a request of confidence in the government.

FRANCO-ITALIAN TREATY. The Italian Chamber of Deputies, after a week's debate, approved the Franco-Italian commercial treaty by a vote of 228 to 84. One of the speakers expressed the hope that a similar treaty would be concluded with the United States.

TO BE CALLED "MCCORMICK." London, Jan. 30.—It is announced that Queen Victoria has been pleased, at the desire of Mr. Leander J. McCormick, of Chicago, to grant a license to Mr. Frederick E. Goodhardt, of Hadlow Castle, Tunbridge, to assume the name of McCormick. The Morning Post says: "We believe this is the first occasion upon which the Britisher has added his American wife's name to his own." Mr. Goodhardt is the Conservative candidate for Devonport.

NO REFERENCE TO NEWFOUNDLAND. Paris, Jan. 30.—The Figaro today declares that the negotiations between the British and French governments do not concern, as supposed, Newfoundland and Madagascar, but the Bahr-el-Ghazal district of the Nile Valley.

ANNIVERSARY OF KING CHARLES'S EXECUTION. London, Jan. 30.—The anniversary of the execution of King Charles I., which was beheaded at Whitehall on Jan. 29, 1649, was celebrated today by the Legationist and Jacobite leagues in London and the provinces. Numbers of wreaths and floral crosses were deposited at the foot of the Charles I. statue in Whitehall in the presence of leading Legationist and Jacobites, who stood bareheaded during the ceremony. Conspicuous among the tributes was a shield, surmounted by a crown of immortelles, from the American Jacobites. Attached to it was a white silk ribbon, inscribed: "America remembers her martyred king."

PARISIANS CRY VIVE L'EMPEREUR. Remarkable Demonstration at a Paris Theater.

Patti Gave Baron Cederstrom an Annuity of \$15,000.

Movement on Foot in London to Establish a Sorosis Society—Luocheni's Confession.

Paris, Jan. 30.—Never has the imperialist party shown its hand so boldly as Sunday, when an astounding manifestation was made by about fifteen hundred supporters of the Bonaparte dynasty at the Nouveau Theater. At this place a drama in five acts is being played. It is called "Le Roi de Rome." It is based on incidents of the First Empire. Word had been passed for the imperialist party to attend in force, and the theater was so crowded that people could not get to their seats without great difficulty in many instances.

Then, after the words, "France is greatly changed. She has become the prey of a gang of intriguers. Napoleon's son has no business in this den of thieves. The Napoleonic tradition is quite dead, the entire audience rose to its feet shouting, 'Non! Non! Vive l'Empereur!'"

When the Duc de Reichstadt asks, "Do you think if I crossed the frontier the people would welcome me?" the audience thundered, "Yes! Yes! Come once! Vive Cassagnac!"

The Duc asks in another passage, "Is the son of Marie Louise less acceptable than the son of Philippe Egalite?" the public replied before the actor could speak: "No! No! Vive l'Empereur!"

More significant still was the demonstration when the soldier says a few words praising the Old Guard, which the entire public saluted with cries of "Vive Napoleon V.!" but when the Duc de Reichstadt recites Victor Hugo's ode, "La Colonne," genuine emotion seized the people, who listened spellbound.

PEOPLE SOBBED AND SHOUTED. As the last verse was being spoken a sort of nervous current of agitation began to run through the audience, and at the end the storm broke out. Cheers and cries of "Vive l'Empereur!" rose in a wild clamor. The people wept, sobbed and shook hands, while the actor was recalled again and again. Bouquets and violets were rained upon him, and finally a huge bunch, tied together with tricolored ribbon, was handed up to him, and the jeunesse Napoleonienne grouped in the balcony waved a French flag bearing the legend, "Vive l'armee! Vive l'Empereur."

At the close the artists were called before the curtain. The death of the King of Rome brought the audience to its feet with the shout, "Vive l'Empereur! Vive Princes Victor!"

One interesting feature of the performance was that only one individual protested. The reception he met with probably warned others who might have felt inclined to imitate him. NEARLY CAPTURED

Daring Plan of Chinese Rebels Frustrated.

The Plot to Take Foo Chow Exposed Two Days Before the Massacre.

Tacoma, Jan. 30.—The steamship Lenox brings news that the Chinese rebels have come very near capturing the city of Foo-Chow, which has nearly a million population. The conspirators were members of the Kolao-Hui, the famous secret society, which had for its object the extermination of foreigners. They won a large number of recruits to its feet shouting, "Non! Non! Vive l'Empereur!"

Two days before the date set apart for the massacre the plot was exposed from the outside. An investigation showed that the secret society leaders had 500 armed men hidden in Foo-Chow ready to seize and pillage when the signal was given.

Nearly half of the native troops composing the Foo-Chow garrison were found to belong to the Kalao-Hui, whose orders they had sworn to obey. Thirty conspirators were arrested, but the rest managed to escape.

The city is being policed by the victory city guard and loyal troops from other cities are being hurried there.

IN A TUNNEL

Twenty-Six Track-Repair Men Run Down—Two Dead and Sixteen Hurt.

Altoona, Pa., Jan. 30.—A gang of 28 track repair men were working on the railroad at the western opening of the Gallitzin tunnel at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when they heard the approach of a locomotive, which was running west through the tunnel. The workmen all stepped from the north track, on which the west-bound trains move, to the south track. The smoke in the tunnel prevented
