COBALT NEWS

At the Silver Queen eight carloads of ore are sacked and ready for shipment, the greater part of which is No. 1, averaging 3,500 ounces of silver to the ton.

The North Cobalt Mining Company made a fine strike of native silver lately on the claim adjoining the Green-Mechan property in the Red Rock district.

McKinley-Darragh has bulkheaded the end of the Cobalt Lake, and is now pumping out, preparatory to sinking in veins that up to this time have been covered with water.

The stock of the Cobalt Silver Mining Company, the first of the Cobalt properties to be offered in London, was listed on the London stock exchange on Monday. Over \$9,000 shares were traded.

The shaft on the big vein of the Tenskanning and Hudson Bay's property is now down 35 feet. A camp is now erected on the workings and negotiations are now in progress for a good plant. There is sufficient rock in the ore house to make a carload and possibly the mine may ship this week.

At the Buffalo a new shaft is being started at the southeast corner of the property, where their rich bonanza vein and other good veins have recently been located. The three main shafts are being sunk to a greater depth, and on the adjoining property the Nancy Helen, one of these Buffalo veins, has already been picked up by trenching.
