FIGHTING IN AFRICA

A French Force Captures 30,000 Prison ers-German Activity in the Cameroons.

Paris, Nov. 23 .- Official reports say captured 30,000 prisoners. In pursuing the king the road was so blocked by decomposing bodies that the army was compelled to take another route.

Advices from Southwest Africa report great activity in the Camaroons. Two German men-of-war are in the bay, many men are being enrolled, and large preparations made for an important expedition into the interior, under command of Governor Puttmaker and Lieut. Carnap. The expedition is probably to co-operate in the large scheme of German expansion to Lake Chad.
London, Nov. 23.—The first contin-

A LION-TAMER ATTACKED

Receives Severe Injuries After Entering the Cage.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 23.—Behind the scenes at the Standard Theater Sunday night Trainer Hall was attacked by Prince, the biggest of the three trained lions, and nearly killed before his rescue. Hall was in the cage brushing the lion off for presentation. tation to the audience. Prince was evidently in a bad humor, for as soon as the trainer entered the cage his mane began to bristle and he showed his big teeth viciously, snapping wickedly at Hall whenever he approached. The trainer gave Princess a prod with his steel rod. Quick as a flash Prince sprang forward in defense of his royal consort, knocking Hall to the floor of the cage. Hall punched the lion furi-ously with his steel rod. Prince struck at him again, and the trainer threw up his right arm to ward off the blow. The lion's claws cut deeply into the flesh of Hall's forearm, ripping open his hand, and the trainer was at Prince's mercy. The attendants rushed to Hall's assistance, and succeeded in beating the animal off with iron bars. Hall's injuries are severe, but not necessarily fatal.

Peace Commissioners Waiting to Hear From Madrid.

Premier Sagasta Says the U.S. Will Take the Philippines,

Spain Being Unable to Contend Against -- American Demands-- A Carlist Rising Imminent.

Paris, Nov. 23 .- At the request of the Spanish peace commissioners, there will be no joint session today, pending instructions from Madrid. The date

of the next meeting is not fixed. As late as 1 o'clock this morning a Spanish commissioner affirmed that he and his colleagues did not know what to do regarding the American

In an interview, Prime Minister Sagasta said that the United States would undoubtedly take the Philippine fortified. It is further stipulated, the Islands, Spain being unable to concorrespondent says, that only wartend further against American de-

mands. Spain, however, would absolutely decline to accept the proposed indemnity for the cession of the islands, considering that the amount offered was simply proposed as charity to her, and, aside from this, the acceptance of the offer would involve the admission of the absurd American claims. Senor Sagasta declared that Spain would certainly not pay the Cuban debt, such liability falling upon whoever takes the sovereignty of the island. He added that he believed that the rebellion the Viscaya Islands was a studied scheme on the part of the Americans to create difficulties for Spain and to make the Philippines an easier prey.

OPEN DOOR INTENTIONS. London, Nov. 23 .- Most of the newspapers comment upon and express satisfaction at the "open door" intentions of the United States in the Philippine Islands. The Pall Mall Gazopen door." It is a wise decision on every ground, in the interest of the prosperity of the Philippines themselves, and as securing the good-will of nations really friendly to America in the Pacific. The community of in-terests of the two English-speaking nations are thereby definitely assured.

house. A HOPEFUL SIGN.

Paris, Nov. 23.-The postponement of today is regarded as a hopeful sign that the treaty will be signed. While the Madrid Government has not yet received the text of the American ultimatum, the Spanish ministers received quite enough by telegraph on Mon-day night to enable them to instruct their commissioners to retire, were such their intentions. It was confidently believed by several of the Americans and those who conversed with the correspondent of the Associated Press today, that before the expiration of the time fixed by the Americans, namely Monday next, the Spaniards will acquiesce in the United States' Philippine offer, and that ultimately the treaty will be signed by all the Spanish commissioners. It is true that the course which Senor Montero Rios, president of the Spanish commission, will follow, is still uncertain, as he continues to "play to the gallery," but a leading member of the American commission believes he will sign with the other Spaniards. In any case, his place on the commission will be speedily filled, probably by Senor Leon y Castillo, the Spanish ambassador here. Senor Montero Rios sent a communication to the American commissioners yesterday evening, asking a number of questions. The most important of them asked in effect if the Americans really meant that the ultimatum must be answered by Monday. The Spaniards were assured that they did, and the answer has cleared the air.

SPAIN'S LAST ANSWER.
