German Commanders Have Lost Their Heads—Reinforcements Led Into Certain Annihilation

(From a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press.)

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, April 19.—The French successes in the forward movement were more considerable than indicated by the published reports or the army communique, which narrate a sober tale of the events. There is no intention of relaxing the pressure on the Germans, who are opposing a very tenacious resistance without avail.

Best points of formidable strength and most important strategic value, such as Oesle, Courtois and Vailly, which have fallen before the French assaults, reports sent by runners from reconnoitering parties indicate steady progress everywhere and large captures of material. The staffs take no risks; everything is methodically prepared in order to be as certain as is humanly possible of success before trying to approach each objective point.

Today the weather was better for operations, but it was so misty that airplanes were almost useless.

DIVISION ANNIHILATED.

The commanders of the German reinforcements hurrying to the front appear to have lost their heads or have been badly directed in several cases. One division marched directly into wire entanglements and was almost entirely annihilated or taken prisoner. Eighteen new German divisions have been thrown into the front since Monday, several of which were blown virtually to pieces by the French artillery immediately after their arrival. Two divisions, launched directly into an ineffectual counter-attack before Juvincourt, suffered in this way.

Owing to the extent of the battle line the Germans are no longer so much favored by maneuvering on the inside line circle. The French soldier's confidence and spirit have been even intensified under the most severe hardships during the advance. Nothing seems to depress him. Even the old territorialists, roaming on the heels of the attacking troops, maintain a constant cheerfulness.

Villages and Forts Taken.

The text of tonight's communication reads: "Between the Somme and the Oise quite violent artillery actions were in progress. North of the Aisne the enemy under our energetic pressure continued to withdraw in the direction of the Chemin-des-Dames. On the course of the day occupied the

AMERICA AWAKENED BY MONSTER PARADE IN NEW YORK CITY

50,000 Men, Women, Boys
and Girls in Line.

ENTENTE FLAGS CHEERED

Hundreds of Distinct Demon-
strations and Recruiting
Meetings.

NEW YORK, April 19.—Through flag-draped Fifth Avenue, where the Stars and Stripes fluted beside the colors of France and Great Britain, nearly 50,000 men and women, boys and girls, marched here today in a parade of patriotism which was cheered by a million more citizens of New York.

The seemingly endless procession was the crowning feature of "Wake Up America Day," designed to bring a flood of recruits to the army and navy of the United States on the anniversary of the battle of Lexington.

While the parade was passing between lanes of densely packed spectators a squadron of airplanes beside the colors of France and Great Britain, nearly 50,000 men and women, boys and girls, marched here today in a parade of patriotism which was cheered by a million more citizens of New York.

CHEERS FOR THE GERMANS IN VISITORS' GALLERIES OF MEXICAN CONGRESS

Mexico City, April 20.—In answer to reports that Germany was endeavoring to influence members of the Mexican Congress to oppose General Carranza's neutrality proclamation, General Edu-ardo Hays, president of the Lower House, has issued the following statement:

"I have no knowledge of German influence on members of congress or of pressure for opposition to plans of neutrality. I acknowledge that in the galleries of congress on Sunday there was a manifestation of sympathy for the German minister, but I immediately called the marshals to order, telling them that any demonstration for or against any diplomat within the chamber was prohibited, because we were obligated, in accordance with strict neutrality in spirit as well as in letter."

HENSALL SHOCKED BY
YOUNG SOLDIER'S DEATH

Fall of Lieut. James MacArthur Stirring

HEINZALL, April 19.—The farmers in this section are now busy on their lands, and the gardeners are also improving the fine weather of this week. About a week ago suffered from a paralytic stroke which has since that left him in a most serious condition.

Miss Muriel Fleming of London, who is an applicant for the position of organist and choir director, will take charge of the musical part of the service in Carmel Church next Sunday, and will play at both services.

SHACKLETON CHEERED.
San Francisco, April 20.—Lieut. Sir Ernest Shackleton, Antarctic explorer, who leaves here today to continue his journey to London from Australia, was accorded an enthusiastic reception last night at a meeting in the Civic Auditorium, at which he spoke under the auspices of the Bohemian Club.

"It isn't 'Alles' any more, it's 'us,'" he said at the conclusion of his address. The audience of several thousand persons responded to his remarks by singing successively, "The Star Spangled Banner," "God Save the King" and "The Marseillaise."

LIEUT. CHALK MISSING.
Winnipeg, April 20.—Lieut. William Joseph Chalk of Winnipeg, aviator in the Royal Flying Corps, has been reported as missing. On the night of April 12 last Lieut. Chalk crossed the German lines in his airplane on what was perhaps his first battle flight, and since then he has never been heard from. He was 26 years of age.

SINN FEIN CONVENTION DECLARES IRELAND FREE; DEMANDS PEACE VOICE

DUBLIN, April 19.—The Sinn Fein convention met today at the Mansion House with Count Plunkett presiding. Two hundred and fifty-seven Irish public boards had been invited to send delegates, but 206 of them declined to do so.

The attendance was large, including, unexpectedly, numerous priests, but no prominent Irish public men took part in the proceedings. The convention proceeded to elect a committee and demanded representation at the peace conference. Arthur Griffith moved a resolution claiming the application to Ireland of President Wilson's principle of national freedom.

The Irish Trades Council, which is mainly composed of men associated with Liberty Hall, was especially prominent in the debate, and in favor of the declaration. The convention added no new elements to those previously opposed to Lord Londonderry and the constitutional movement.

VIENNA POLITICAL ROW
DUE TO GERMAN PARTY

London, April 20.—According to the understanding here, the Austrian political crisis has its origin in the desire of the Austrian Government to solve political questions, such as that of languages in Bohemia along parliamentary lines, so as not to run counter to democratic feelings, especially in Russia. However, peace negotiations with which the nation are preoccupied, Austrian newspapers are urging the dissatisfied German party to adapt themselves to the conditions, but it appears that the party is not inclined to take this attitude.

WINNIPEG BREAD HIGHER.
Winnipeg, April 20.—A further increase in the price of bread comes into effect today, making the cost of a one-pound loaf eight cents. The advance of one cent is due, according to the bakers, to the increased cost of materials and labor.
