Gathering of
Porters Attend
by Session.

June 29.—Anyone who un-
derstand that there is a
split in the Liberal organiza-
tion and a few hours, or for
a few minutes, at an East

delegates to attend the Dominion Lib-
eral convention. The meeting had not
very widely advertised, owing to
the fact that the members had decided
to choose the delegates at a session of
the executive. Despite the fact that

Delegates Chosen.
W. G. Charlton, Aylmer; Dr. F. H.
Miller, Aylmer; Lew Johnson, Bayham;
J. C. Dance, Kingsmill. The alternates
include: Reeve M. McVicar of Dor-
chester, Blake Miller of Aylmer, Lloyd
Grant of Staffordville, and N. S. Corbett
of Port Stanley. Wilson H. Mills of
Sparta, the recently-nominated candi-
date for the Legislature, was chosen at
Toronto as one of the 28 delegates to
represent the provincial association. Mr.
Mills' supporters in East Elgin were
quite pleasantly surprised when they
learned last night that he had been
chosen out of the entire delegation at
Toronto.

There were no addresses at last
night's meeting, but Percy Dennis, the
newly-chosen president, called on W. G.
Charlton, who arrived before the close
of the meeting, to tell them of his trip
to Toronto. This well-known Lib-
eral responded to by going over the
proceedings at Toronto and explaining
the platform of the newly-formed Lib-
eral party. Mr. Charlton quite agree-
d with Hon. D. D. McKenzie, who stated
that the Liberals have refused the op-
portunity to return to the fold, and con-
sequently are apparently determined to
be left out.

Democratic Convention.
"A more democratic convention I
never attended," declared Mr. Char-
lton. "It was purely democratic from
start to finish, and it shows quite plainly
the spirit of the Liberals of today." Mr.
Charlton declared that he had not the
slightest doubt but that a provincial
election will make its appearance this
fall. "I do not think that prohibition
will be enacted by the Government ac-
cording to the will of the people, and kept
out of politics," Mr. Charlton expressed the belief that
Mr. Dewar would make an excellent

leader, and he also thought that Mr.
McKenzie would be a very successful
leader of the Dominion Opposition. He
was very much impressed by the Hon.
Wilfrid Laurier's remarks concerning Sir
