LONDON'S POPULATION IS CLIMBING STEADILY NEARER TO THE 100,000 MARK

No Mushroom Growth, But a Steady, Substantial Increase Backed by Splendid Business Prosperity—Every Home Erected by the Housing Commission Will Be Needed For Influx of New Residents.

London's prospects of having a population of 100,000 within the near future are excellent, E. R. Dennis, chairman of the housing commission declared in an interview with The Advertiser today. His duties as head of the commission bring him in close touch with the growth of the city, and he is able to base his assertion on facts.

Whole families are moving into London every week, and the average person does not realize just how fast the population is growing," he said. "In addition to the many large factories which are coming here, there are many smaller businesses being opened, and all these are doing their share to add to the prosperity of the city.

"I do not look for any mushroom growth, such as Windsor or Welland has experienced. We do not want that kind. If we are going to expand like that, we will have to attract a class of people that is not desirable. At present we are getting skilled mechanics and other classes of workers who are a real asset to the city. It will pay us to go slowly and get good Canadian citizens like that because it will insure substantial growth.

GERMANY EXPECTS ALLIED NATIONS TO FULFIL PROMISE

Head of Financial Delegation So Informs Correspondent.

Paris, Oct. 3.—Germany will expect the Allies to keep the promise given at Spa that the total sum of reparations to be demanded of Germany shall be fixed by the conference this autumn. Gerhard von Muller, head of the German financial delegation, stated that the German government would be glad to open negotiations with French and German experts.

PULP MILL WORKERS MEETING AT OTTAWA
