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he game for wages. But amateurs are pllowed to take salarled offices in country clubs with a minimum of work and take part in games with professionals, while players who have shared the profits of tours have not lost their amateur status. In rowing the definition is long. drastic and severe. It is the only sport in which the social position of a man is taken into consideration, and on this subject the French Federation has refused to support the Amateur Rowing Association of England. It is also something to which the American oarsmen can never be reconciled. In rowing no oarsr an is an amateur who has competed for morey with or against a professional, or for a prize, who has taught athletic exercises for profit, who has been employed in or about boats, or who has been by trade or employment for wages a mechanie, artisan or laborer, or engaged in manual labor or any menial duty. In athletics, swimming, gymnastics and

wrestling the definition is practically identical, an amateur being one who has never competed for money or a staked bet, taught any athletic exercise for gain, or taken part in any competition with any one who is not an amateur. In cycling the amateur is one who has never engaged in or taught any athletic exercise for money or other remunera-tion, or knowingly competed with or against a professional for a prize in public. In lawn tennis, polo and lacrosse the amateur is not defined, no necessity" having arisen owing to the fact that in, England professionals do not take part in these sports, and the Canadian profesdonals are not expected to worry about the Olympic games.

In Association football any player registered with the Football Association as a professional or receiving any consideration above his necessary hotel and travel-'ing expenses actually paid, is considered a professional. In the Rugby Union game the rules defining amateurs and professionals are long and elaborate, and no player who takes part in a Northern Ution game, no matter what his social status may be, can play in the Rugby Union game, professionalism not being recognized as in the sister code. A playe: who receives anything beyond his necessary hotel and traveling expenses is also a professional.

In fencing the definition is the same as in athletics, with exceptions in favor of school-masters who teach fencing as part of their duties without extra renuneration and commissioned officers of the forces in respect of work done in their capacity as officers. In golf the amateur is one who has never made any article connected with the game, carried clubs for hire after the age of 15 years (or at any time within six years of playing) or received consideration for playing a match or giving lessons in the game.
