OTTAWA. March 23.-(Special.)-Declaring the construction of the Newmarket Canal to be a sheer waste of public money, and that it was begun to se ve the political ends of the Liberal party in North York, the opposition, led by Capt. Tom Wallace, to-day divided the house on the question.

Sir Wilfrid's defence consisted principally of the argument that some North York Conservatives had asked that the canal be constructed. The yote was 112 to 71 against the amendment.


