The boys' department of the Central Y. M. C. A. is the fourth largest on the continent and stands at the head for the enrollment membership for Bible study with a total of 537. The general membership in the boys' department is about 700. The eredit for the establishment of the boys' department is due to F. M. Pratt, who organ-ized it 14 years ago. The members are

Trained Volunteer Leaders.

A general division of the boys' department is made of those who attend school, and boys at work. They are, further divided into small clubs, of ten boys, each with a trained adult volunteer supervisor. The volunteer leaders are trained each Monday night at a class conducted by R. C. Ding-

The boys' building contains a grill and diving room, and a number of class rooms. The small cluss meet weekly for religious, business and other lines of study. Some of the clubs are formed of boys belonging to the big department stores and factories. They have their regular weekly

supper at the boys' building.
About 100 members from the upper forms of the high schools meet for supper in the boys' club dining hall every Friday night. A Bible talk for half an hour is followed by an address on some other suitable topic. The Big Brother Movement has been


