## Y.M.C.A. JUNIOR BRANCH FOURTH IN ALL AMERICA

What the Central Association is Doing to Develop Boys Morally, Mentally and Physically.

The boys' department of the Central Y. M. C. A. is the fourth largest on the continent, and stands at the head for the enrollment membership for Bible study with a total of 137. The general membership in the boys' department is about 700. The credit for the establishment of the boys' department is due to F. M. Pratt, who organized it 14 years ago. The members are from 15 to 18 years of age.

At the outset a back basement room on McGill-street was assigned for the boys' club. Two rooms formed the accommodation until three years ago, when two stores at the south of the Central on Yonge-street were purchased by the board of management and furnished for a completely equipped boys' department.

Older Boys Control Work.  
Harry Blyie, chairman, and other young business men form a committee which controls the boys' work. The detail work of the club is handled by a committee of the older boys who are elected semi-annually by ballot. The sections are held in September for the fall and in January for the spring term. At the recent election 50 nominations were made for the 25 boys to be elected to the department council. Under the existing method any councilman who is not properly attending to his duties may be asked by the club authorities to resign, and the one next in order in the election list takes his place. Five years ago the management decided to appoint a special secretary for the boys' department, to devote his whole time to its supervision. Taylor Station, the present occupant of the position, was secured, and the appointment resulted in the membership increasing by leaps and bounds, and it has doubled in number under his superintendence.

In the basement rooms there was practically nothing but physical work possible, and the side street entrance was not inspiring. The removal to their Yonge-street club rooms was
