STREET WATERING ON SUNDAY A NECESSITY

Works Committee of Hamilton Council, on Legal Advice, Decides To Continue It.

HAMILTON, July 5.—(Special.)—The works committee of the city council to-night decided to continue watering the streets on Sundays, as City Solicitor Waddell said that he did not think that it was contrary to law, as he considered it a work of necessity.

It was found impossible to continue Victoria-avenue and other adjacent streets to the bay, owing to the fact that the Grand Trunk owns a large portion of the intervening property.

A petition was presented from a number of residents of the newly-annexed district in the southeast, requesting that a bylaw be passed prohibiting the erection of livery stables, blacksmith shops, etc., in the district between Trolley-street and Sherman-avenue, south of King, so that it can be reserved as a residential section. The committee considered that the petition was not largely enough signed to warrant action.

A complaint was received about the dump between King and Main-streets, on the Dundas-road, and the matter will be looked into.

The T. H. and B. applied for permission to construct two extra tracks and a switch on its line thru the eastern part of the city, for the purposes of interchanging freight with the Grand Trunk. The committee turned the matter over to the Dominion Railway Commission.

For the building of sewers in the district south of Aberdeen-avenue and west of Garth-street, bulk tenders will be advertised. The work will cost in the neighborhood of \$16,954.

The condition of Mrs. Dorothy Holson continues to be very grave, and her death is looked for hourly.

Inquests in the Church Minutes.

The subject arose over the suggestion to take away the minutes of the congregation of St. Anne's Church at Niagara Falls, because they contained innuendoes of a derogatory character to the late minister, Rev. Dr. Crawford, which it was desired that the new minister should not see. In the end it was decided not to take charge of the minutes, but to leave them in the hands of the members of the congregation, who will be asked not to show them to the new minister.

FINEST IN THE WORLD

Viennese Professor of Agronomy, Praises Ontario Agricultural College.

GUELPH, July 5.—(Special.)—Professor Tschermak, doctor of agronomy in the University of Vienna, one of the best known authorities on plant breeding in the world, was a visitor in this city yesterday.

In giving his impressions of the Ontario Agricultural College, he said: "You have a more extensive experimental department, and, really, I think, also a finer agricultural college than any I have yet visited."

"Are your grain experts as far advanced or as scientific in their work as yours are in the older countries?" the reporter asked.

"No," was the reply, "and it is not necessary that they should be. Here they are first of all practical. They study how the farmer can grow the most grain at the least expense, and to make the best profits, which I think is all as it should be for a young and growing country like this. Circumstances make it worth our while to study more quality, and it is worth your while to study more the question of quantity."

AVIATION MEET OPENING IS POSTPONED ONE DAY

Inability to Get Aeroplanes Transported From Montreal in Expected Time Delays Toronto Events Until Friday.

Owing to the unavoidable delay in securing the transportation of the unwieldy aeroplanes from Montreal, it has been found necessary to postpone the opening of the great international aviation meet at Toronto, from Thursday to Friday next.

The various machines, including the three Bleriot monoplanes belonging to Comte de Lesseps and the five Wright biplanes, were to have been shipped from Montreal this morning, but it was found impossible to have them prepared for shipment and to secure the large cars necessary for their transport, in time to have them ready for a flight on Thursday afternoon. The corps of aviators will reach here to-morrow morning and will go over the site selected on the Trethewey farm, near Weston.

All arrangements were practically completed yesterday for the handling of the crowds that are expected to witness the flights. A large staff of men were busily engaged in the erection of the grand stand, the fencing of the field and the construction of a restaurant on the grounds. The stands will be of a new variety, there being three tiers of platforms, one above and behind the other. Each platform will be 600 feet long, with three rows of seats, and the total capacity will be 6000. A space will be wired off for the accommodation of automobiles and the restaurant will be conducted by the association itself.

Arrangements have been completed with Brigadier-General Cotton, whereby a detachment of the Royal Canadian Dragoons from Stanley Barracks will camp on the grounds for taking observations as to the adaptability of the flying machines for military purposes. The grounds will be in charge of Capt. E. A. Williams and E. R. Carrington of Montreal, and there will be a force of county police under High Constable Ramsden. The meet will open on Friday afternoon at 8 o'clock, and will run thru each day until 8 o'clock in the evening. Both railways will give a special train service direct to the grounds at short intervals, and tickets covering transportation and admission will be on sale at the Union Depot.

ROSS ROBERTSON'S GIFT TO AFFLICTED CHILDREN

Donates Pavillon at Island for the Treatment of Juveniles III With Tuberculosis.

The new pavilion for the care of children afflicted with tuberculosis was formally dedicated and opened yesterday before about 100 people on the lawn of the Lakeside Home at the Island. The building was erected by J. Ross Robertson and handed over as a contribution to assist the organization in its work.

The Heather Club was organized and named sixteen months ago by Miss Josephine Hamilton and Dr. George Porter and is affiliated with the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. Its special care is the children under the age of 15 years. Its purpose is to catch the disease in its early stages and snatch the little ones from the way of the grim reaper. There are at present 10 children—six boys and four girls—in the new pavilion, all of whom cheered the donor at the conclusion of the ceremony. The furnishings were all donated by the Heather Club, which is growing to be one of the best organizations of its kind in the world. Dr. Elliott Brown presided.

In tendering the building in connection with the Hospital for Sick Children, Mr. Robertson complimented the club on its organization, growth and good work. It was gratifying to know that such interest is being taken in a work that was so necessary. Two life members, Miss Brent, superintendent of the Hospital for Sick Children, and Miss Josephine Hamilton, president of the Heather Club, had been elected on this occasion, the necessary fee of \$20 having been advanced for each by parties whom he was not at liberty to mention.

The Dividends He Gets.

There was some curiosity as to why the name Heather Club had been selected for the club. He presumed this was because of its representative character as the emblem of all that was good and great in Scottish history. It certainly was never more nobly employed. He thanked Dr. Elliott Brown for his kind words, and said: "I have been frequently asked if I ever get any dividends out of these things. Well, I must say I do. The You will appreciate what it means when there are 161 children being nursed back to health, that there were 50 or 60 more in the mother hospital on Colborne-street during the past week, that since 1892 there have been 500 maimed and crippled children of all areas treated here to health, and that as one goes in and about the streets of the city, being called by name and chattered to these same children, some grown to manhood, in full possession of their

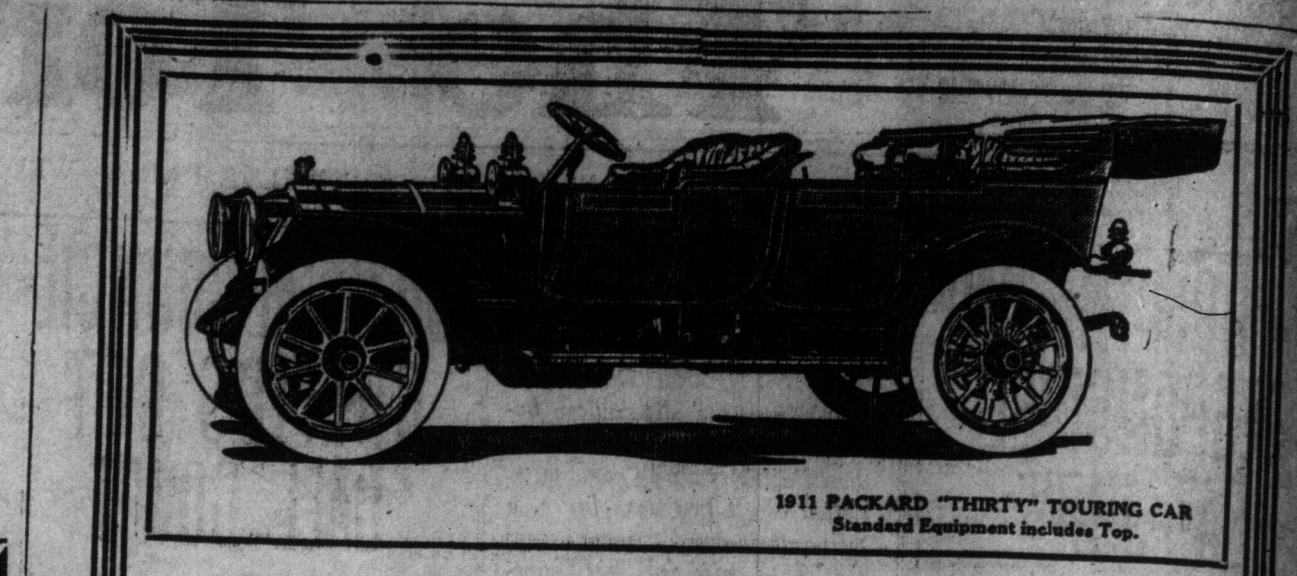

STUCK TO POST WITH BROKEN SKULL.

BUFFALO, July 5.—By sheer force of will power, George S. Whitney, 50, an American express messenger, running between Cleveland and Buffalo on the Lake Shore road, stuck to his post last night after his skull had been fractured in two places by the heavy roof of the car closing on it as the train pulled out of Dunkirk, N.Y. The car contained a valuable consignment of express matter, including \$10,000 in currency, consigned to Buffalo, and this Whitney appeared to worry over more than his injury.

Drummond, the latest addition to the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Steamship Co.'s fleet, arrived at the docks of the Lake Superior Corporation Glasgow for the Algoma Steel Company. The event was marked by a reception and luncheon to Mayor Simpson and the town council. She is 258 feet long, 45 feet 10 inches beam, with a capacity of 400 tons, and is equipped with the latest appliances in marine architecture for handling cargo and comfort of crew.
