

REAL WAR SCENES IN FAMOUS FILM

Havoc and Devastation Are Shown in "Mothers of France" Picture.

GOVERNMENT DIRECTED

French Authorities Showed World What War Meant to France.

In the opinion of every person who has seen "Mothers of France," the superb photo-drama that is presented at the Strand Theatre, in conjunction with The Toronto World, there can be no question whatever as to the overwhelming and undoubted success it will achieve next week. It was the French Government's avowed intention to show the world what the war has meant to France and to France's motherhood. And it has certainly done so with unexampled success.

The fearful havoc and devastation that the Huns have wrought in France is shown in many scenes. Most notable among them are the scenes of the Cathedral of Rheims, where the destruction of this historic edifice is plainly shown. Outside the principal, the only composed emotion of French soldiers and peasants. The picture should be a real recruiting force, as it is quite impossible to look on unmoved both by patriotism and by sympathy with those brave mothers, not only of France, but of every country allied to France, whose lives have been devastated by the carnage and the bloodstained which the brutal, death-dealing Huns have brought to so many lands.

Election of Officers Closes Women's Missionary Convention

Special to The Toronto World. Kingston, May 3.—With a stirring address by Rev. Dr. R. P. MacKay, Toronto, general secretary of the foreign mission board, the convention of the Provincial Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was brought to a close this afternoon. Ottawa was selected as the next place of meeting.

Mrs. Charles Robertson, of Toronto, was re-elected president, and the following additional officers were elected:

First vice-president, Mrs. J. D. Walker, Toronto; second vice-president, Mrs. McQuesten, Hamilton; third vice-president, Mrs. H. R. Horne, Cobourg; fourth vice-president, Mrs. R. Barbour, Meaford; recording secretary, Mrs. Charles G. Begg, Toronto; corresponding secretary, Mrs. F. H. Rose, Toronto; mission band secretary, Mrs. M. Rennie, New Hamburg; supply secretary, Mrs. J. MacMillan, Toronto; treasurer, Mrs. J. G. Gauld, Hamilton. Miss MacMillan, Hamilton, and Mrs. Laddow, Bradford, were added to the board of management. Two others will be selected by the board.

INSPECTS UNIVERSITY BATTERY.

President Falconer of the University of Toronto will inspect the 8th University Battery at Exhibition Camp this afternoon. He will see the unit perform section gun drill, witness a selected detachment go through artillery manoeuvres with the 18-pounder guns, and visit the unit's quarters.

Over Thousand Women Applied For Munition Work Last Month

During the month of April, in Toronto, 1042 women applied for work on munitions, while 407 positions were offered and 353 were secured, according to Dr. W. R. Riddell, superintendent of the trades and labor branch yesterday.

In Toronto 125 men and 91 boys applied for farm work, 55 of the former and 33 of the latter being placed. The totals for Toronto and Hamilton for the month were: Applications, 1,931; positions offered, 1,334; persons referred to positions, 1,280; and positions secured, 1,062.

WORK ON FRUIT FARMS.

Thirty girls will go to Vinona for work in the fruit district beginning May 15. For the first two weeks they will assist in a canning factory in the district. Later a second group will occupy the house on the Denny property in Beamsville. Owing to the large response from women willing to work along this line it is probable that camps will be started in other centres by the committee of the Y. W. C. A. who have this work in hand.
