BUFFALO'S POLICE METHODS AND THEIR SIGNAL SYSTEM

Force May Be Mobilized in Record Time to Cope With Need in Any Part of City -How Toronto Officers View It.



Chief of Police Higgins of Buffalo admits it, and so do our own Toronto police officials, altho not with the same enthusissm.

Buffalo has adopted a police signal system which is considered to be the aeme of perfection. There was an original installation of this system in original installation of this system in three precincts, or divisions, as they are called here, three years ago. Chief Higgins has just had two more precincts equipped at a cost of \$145,7,000. In this system, which was constructed by a Buffalo company, the old idea of using a number of boxes on a circuit was abolished, and individual circuits are supplied to each box. 


