## KING COMPLETES PLANS FOR TOUR

**Opens Series of Liberal Lectures by Meeting in Victoria, Sept. 27.**

Ottawa, Sept. 10. — (By Canadian Press.)—Plans for the western tour of Hon. Mackenzie King have been completed. Mr. King will commence his tour of British Columbia and the prairie provinces by addressing a public meeting at Victoria, B.C., on the evening of Monday, Sept. 27. All the principal points in British Columbia and the prairie provinces will be visited by the Liberal leader before his return to Ottawa, some seven weeks later.

**Those in the Party.**  
Mr. King will be accompanied by Ernest Lapointe, M.P., who was recently elected to represent Quebec East, the seat so long held by the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier; W. C. Kennedy, M.P. for North Essex, Ont., and Wm. Duff, M.P., representing the constituency of Lunenburg, N.S., in the federal house. Hon. H. S. Beland will join the party in British Columbia. The outline of the itinerary so far arranged follows: Victoria, Monday, Sept. 27; Vancouver, Wednesday, Sept. 29; Prince Rupert, Oct. 2; Edmonton, Wednesday, Oct. 5.

## FAVOR CO-OPERATIVE STORE MOVEMENT

**Danforth Decides to Open Branch—Thirty Houses To Be Built.**

Under the auspices of the Woodbine Heights Ratepayers' Association, a well attended meeting was held in Savoy Hall, Holborn avenue, last night, to further discuss the U. F. O. co-operative stores movement. W. Miller, president occupied the chair. R. H. Palmer, organizer, outlined the scheme since its inauguration in the old country in 1914, and its remarkable progress to the present day. At the conclusion of Mr. Palmer's address, which was well received, the meeting endorsed the movement and decided to open a branch store in the district. Twenty-five new members were enrolled, and a committee was appointed to canvass the section for members with an objective of 500.

A five-acre site on the south side of Danforth avenue, one block east of Victoria Park avenue, has just been sold to a syndicate for \$25,000 by J. D. McGregor & Company. The purchasers will commence immediately the erection of 30 dwelling houses, continuing next spring to cover the remainder of the land with additional houses. The frontage on Danforth avenue is 350 feet with a depth of 530 feet.

H. Massey, real estate broker, Pape avenue, writing "The World from Cardiff, South Wales, states that he is at present touring the British Isles and incidentally sizing up the housing situation in the old land, which is presenting many interesting features.

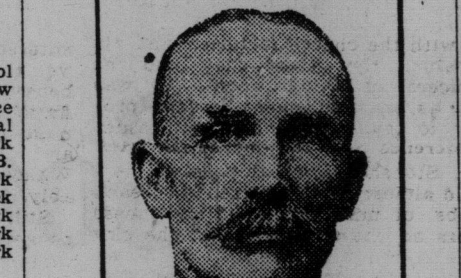
Danforth and South York Poultry Association will hold the first meeting in their new hall, Frankland School, Logan avenue, next week with the annual young bird show.

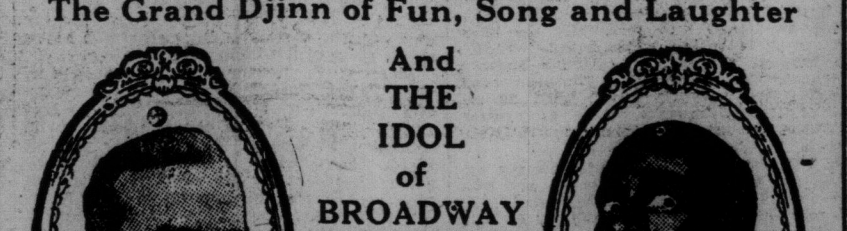
