Bled To Death Before the Doctors Could Reach Him.

WAS POPULAR YARDMASTER

Heroic Attempt Made By His Comrades To Save His Life --- Leaves Wife and Family.

He fell right across the tracks and in an instant both legs had been cut off near the hips by the wheels of the freight cars.

The train was stopped almost instantly and Yardmen Keller and Larkin lifted their comrade to one side of the track and worked desperately to stop the flow of blood with handkerchiefs and strips torn from their clothes.

Notwithstanding the efforts the men made, the blood continued to pour forth, and in less than fifteen minutes Mr. O'Leary died without having

SEPARATE PRISON FOR JUVENILES

Associate With the Older Criminals.

Ottawa, June 10 .- At the Senate yesterday, Mr. A. H. Comeau, of Nova Scotia, proposed a resolution declaring that in the opinion of the Senate steps should be taken to provide an institution for the keeping of juvenile con-

victs separate from other prisoners. Senator Comeau called attention to the change of view regarding penal institutions which are now regarded, not only as places of punishment, but places of correction and training as well. He thought criminality in Canada would be reduced by keeping separate in penal institutions, classes of criminals who were not hardened from the older criminals, who would exercise a bad influence upon juvenile offenders. He suggested that the minister of justice should take up this question with the wardens of the
