

These mills do a very extensive flouring business, manufacturing over one hundred thousand barrels per annum for exportation, besides supplying a large local market.

FOUNDERS AND MACHINISTS.—George N. Oill, on St. Paul street, near James, is doing a good business in this line, employing from twenty to twenty-five hands. Chauncey Yale, on Ontario street, corner of Church, employs about thirty men, an engine of ten horse power, and turns out about forty thousand dollars' worth of manufactured wares per annum.

MARBLE WORKS.—There are two marble yards: one on James street, near St. Paul, carried on by William Baron; and the other by Thomas Gadsby, on Queenston street, near the Thorold road.

PAPER MANUFACTURERS.—There is a large paper mill at Centreville, carried on by John Riordan, who employs over forty hands in the manufacture of various descriptions and qualities of paper.

PLANING MILLS.—Charles W. Hellems, on Geneva street, corner St. Paul, employs a large number of hands in the manufacture of sashes, blinds, doors, planing lumber, &c.

POTASH MANUFACTURING.—In this branch there are two establishments: that of W. & H. Campbell, on St. Paul street, between Court and Centre; and Thomas Cloney, on Division street.

PUMP MAKING.—There is only one shop, carried on by A. M. Mills, on St. Paul street.

SAIL MAKING AND SHIP BUILDING.—James McCourt, St. Paul street, near Canal Bridge, is doing a large business in fitting and rigging vessels—many of them being built at the extensive ship-yard of L. Shickluna, who employs about two hundred men, and does a business of over one hundred and fifty thousand dollars per annum.

SASH, BLINDS AND DOORS.—S. G. Dolson, on Church street, head of King, is doing a good business in this line.

TANNERIES.—There are two tanneries, carried on by James Cairns, 84 St. Paul, and Thomas Bunting, 82 St. Paul street.

TOBACCO AND CIGARS.—In this branch, Harris & Berston do a very extensive trade, employing about fifteen hands, and turning out sixty thousand dollars' worth per annum.

WOOLLEN MILLS.—Abell & Wilkerson employ six hands, and
