

# FUSILIERS TIE FOR LEAGUE LEAD BY WIN OVER SUSSEX TEAM

## DOWN COLTS IN LAST PERIOD BY SCORE OF 3 TO 1

Play Was Sensational and Rough—Many Players Injured—Big Crowd

BY scoring three goals in a minute and a half in the last period, the Saint John Fusiliers defeated the Sussex Colts at Sussex last night by a score of 3 to 1 and went into a tie with the Moncton Athletics for first place in the Southern New Brunswick league.

The game was very fast and rough, several players being injured and others penalized. Much tripping and slashing and several near fist fights kept the spectators in an uproar. Brad Gilbert, who played a stellar game, was knocked out three times. Jimmy Mountain, who also starred, was carried from the ice unconscious, and Halley, Keating and Wilson also were injured. Hunter, of the Colts, also was hurt, receiving a nasty cut on his head.

Phil Halliday, for the Fusiliers, and Harold Radcliffe, for the Colts, were the individual stars. Both goalies also showed to advantage, Wilson being almost unbreakable. He handled 31 shots in the first period as compared with 6 by Roach.

The Sussex team turned in a good game and should give any team in the league a stiff argument.

**FIRST PERIOD.**

Play was in Saint John territory practically all the first period. Sussex forced the issue and Wilson was called upon to make several sensational saves. The situation was relieved from time to time by solo rushes by the Saint John players and one time Keating sagged the twice back of Roach, but the play was ruled offside. In this session Brad Gilbert was injured when he crashed into the boards.

**SECOND PERIOD.**

Gilbert was again taken from the ice when he was hit between the eyes with a stick at the opening of the second period.

Harold Radcliffe, by a sensational display of stick-handling, carried the puck from near his own net to the Fusiliers and scored the first tally of the game.

Play got rough in this period and Thompson and Hunter were penalized, the former twice and the latter three times. Hay also took a rest. Saint John forced hard in the last period and only good work on the part of Roach held them in check.

**THIRD PERIOD.**

The Fusiliers opened a terrific attack in the third period and were only prevented from scoring by the good defensive work of Harold Radcliffe and Bill Hay.

After a pretty rush down the ice, Halliday netted the first score for the Fusiliers. He was followed a minute later by Kiley and the game was put on ice by Mountain, who scored with a hard drive from centre which Roach failed to see.

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## CLUBS FORMED TO AID YOUNGER SKATERS HERE

**First Series of Races to Be Held at Lily Lake on Saturday Afternoon**

Interest in developing the younger skaters of this city has been aroused and as a result the Lily Lake Skating Club has been formed with J. King Hazen as provisional president and R. G. Schofield as provisional secretary. The club has become affiliated with the New Brunswick Skating Association and has received a sanction to hold races. The first series will be held on Saturday afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock sharp, and will consist of half mile for boys under 14 years, one mile for 16 years, senior one mile and senior one mile handicap. The handicap race is to give those not so fast as the stars a chance to win and also make the youngsters skate faster in order to win.

The entries for these races will be on Friday evening at 6 o'clock at the office of Thomas Nagle, Prince William street. All competitors must be registered with the New Brunswick Skating Association and produce their registration cards at the time of entering.

The idea of these races is to furnish competition for the young skaters and develop them so that they can worthily represent the city in senior meets in later years.

The entries for the Lily Lake Club will be for the Victoria Rink, the Arena and the West Side rink, and these clubs will receive a sanction to hold races. The Association, who will issue a blanket sanction permitting the clubs to hold races any time they wish, except champion events.

At the end of the season the one with the highest number of points in each class will receive a silver cup.

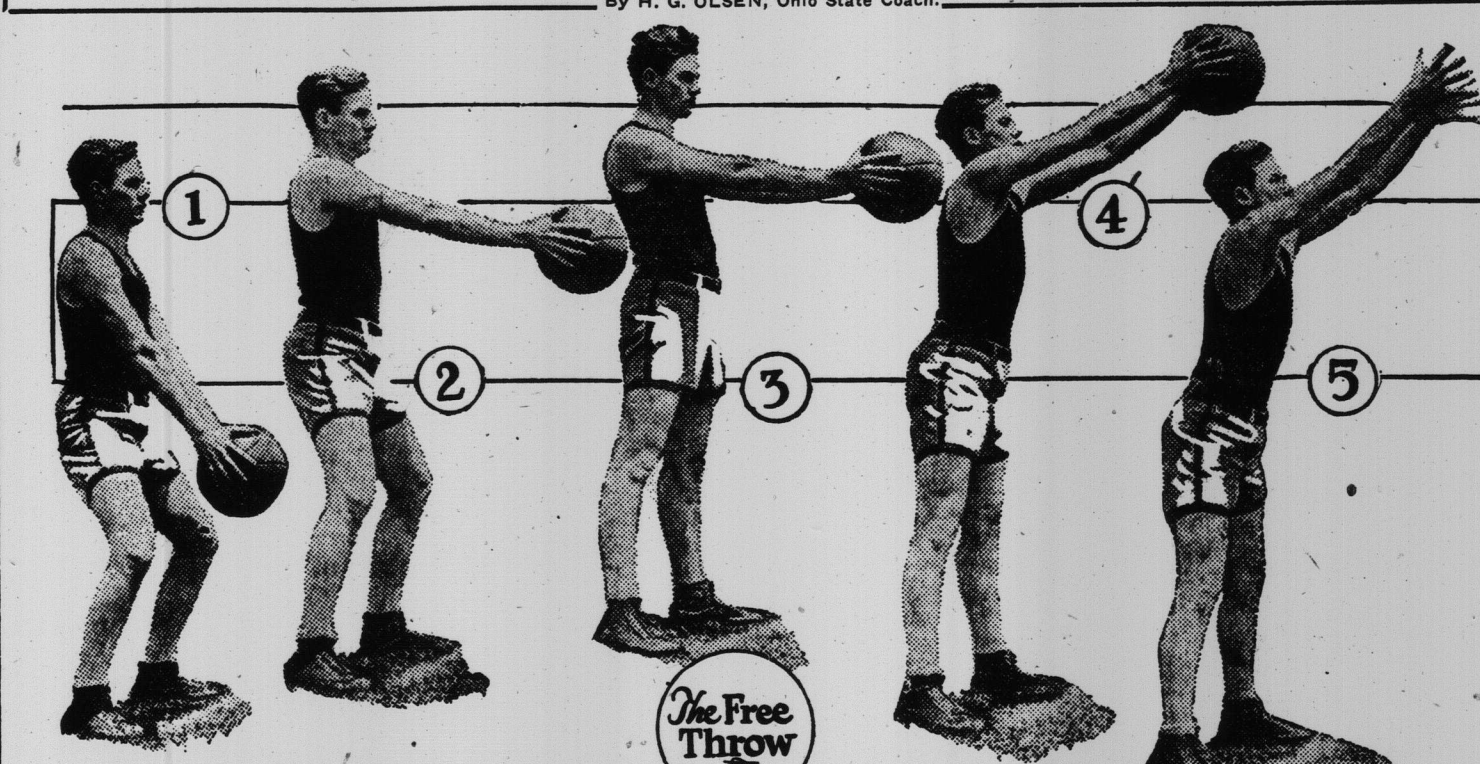

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## WOULD BANISH FOR YEAR ANY MAKING BETS

**Also in Favor of Statute of Limitations With Respect to Baseball Offences**

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—Baseball players guilty of betting on games or rewarding the players or management of other clubs will face a year's suspension, and perhaps banishment forever from organized football, if the suggestions to be offered by Commissioner Landis are adopted.

The suggestions, designed to prevent any more scandals in baseball will be presented to a committee representing the major leagues, and also the minors, at French Lick Springs, Ind., next Monday.

Commissioner Landis said he hoped to have these suggestions made a part of baseball.

1. A statute of limitations with respect to alleged baseball offences, as in our state and national statutes with regard to criminal offences.

2. Ineligibility for one year for offering or giving any gift or reward by the players or management of one club to the players or management of another club for services rendered or supposed to be or had been rendered in defeating a competing club.

3. Ineligibility for one year for betting any sum whatever upon any ball game in connection with which the better had no duty to perform.

4. Permanent ineligibility for betting any sum whatever upon any ball game in connection with which the better has any duty to perform.
