## HOFF SAYS HE WILL TAKE HIS CASE TO COURT

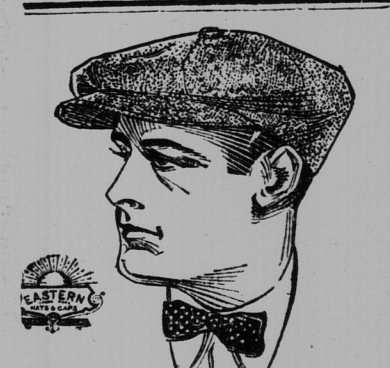
Wants Publication of Charges Made Against Him

PASADENA, Cal., May 28.—Charles Hoff, of Norway, world's champion pole vaulter, barred from further competition in the United States by the committee on foreign relations of the A. A. U., declared here yesterday that he intends to fight the national amateur organization in the courts. Hoff demanded that the committee make public its charges against him. Hoff's case has been attracting national attention for some time. He was billed to appear at a coast meet, but declined to do so. The foreign relations committee gave him a certain length of time in which to make up his mind and told him it would suspend him for non-appearance. Hoff did not appear, claiming he was sick. Apparently, before he leaves, he seeks to have the charges against him definitely set forth in order to clear up his amateur status.

## YANKS TIED IN EXHIBITION GAME

Springfield Hold American Leaders to 10-All Tie Yesterday

NEW YORK, May 28.—Cincinnati, recovering after a four-game slump again lifted its margin of leadership in the National League to two and one half contests over the Chicago Cubs. By the same token Brooklyn again rises to the first division, and the St. Louis Cardinals drop a place. St. Louis fell before Cincinnati twice yesterday, 4 to 3, and 2 to 1, while Brooklyn, after losing three straight to the New York Giants, managed to take half a double bill at Philadelphia. Clarence Mitchell, left-hander, pitched excellent ball in the opening contest at Philadelphia, and won from the Dodgers 3 to 1. Douglas McWeeny served a five-hit performance in the concluding tilt to win, 5 to 1. Pittsburgh raised its world's series pennant and accepted the usual setback in affairs of this kind, when Tony Kaufmann elevated to the opening round of ball to win by the Springfield Club of the Eastern League. Walter Johnson of Washington took a beating from the Mackens 3 to 2. The St. Louis Browns after a disastrous road trip, returned home with a victory over Cleveland 8 to 5. Chicago and Detroit battled 12 innings, a fumble by Red Wingo in left field giving the White Sox the decision 5 to 4.
