Doc. Crandall, Former Giant Star, Now On Coast In His 22nd Year of Baseball

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28.—Pitchers may go to the well once too often and be broken but, to followers of the Pacific Coast baseball league, it seems that "Doc" Crandall will go to the well one more time.

"Doc" has been puzzling batters for 22 years, using his famed "change of pace" for most of that time, and bids fair to win his usual 20 ball games this year.

GOOD PITCHER

By the way, Crandall has demonstrated here that he is a good pitcher, even when he can't use his pace switch. The Portland park is small and the lively ball makes the form of pitching Crandall invented, that of the long ago when he was a team-mate of Christy Mathewson, a hazardous feat.

Crandall uses the change of pace by tossing a fast ball and then putting over one thrown with the same motion but at half the speed.

The amateur union went ahead, however, and recently Hoff announced his intention of returning to Norway.

Apparently, before he leaves, he seeks to have the charges against him definitely set forth in order to clear up his amateur status.



The local competitors are working out every evening under Louis Donovan and Art Garnett, and the Armouries present a busy sight with youngsters all the way from 100 to 150 pounds working down to their class weight and improving their speed and cleverness.

HAIR LINE DECISIONS. The Provincial Championships decided here some weeks ago were first events, but it does not follow that the champions declared at that time will also be crowned at this meet.

Some of the awards were hair line decisions, many of the bouts going into extra rounds and it is very possible that the runners-up last time may reverse the tables on their opponents next Monday.
