FATHER DUKE SAYS CONGRESS ALL WONDERFUL

Speaks for Saint John Party on Return From Chicago

STRIKING SCENES AT ASSEMBLAGE

Tells of Perfection of Arrangements in Carrying Out Program

Describing the various scenes witnessed by pilgrims at the International Eucharistic Congress recently brought to a close at Chicago, as truly marvelous, spectacles which, unless viewed by the eyes, could hardly be made to exist even in a vivid imagination, Rev. William M. Duke, rector of the Cathedral parish, returned to the city yesterday afternoon from Chicago along with the other Saint John pilgrims, the Maritime party having disbanded at Moncton yesterday noon when they reached there from Montreal.

The Rt. Rev. James Morrison, D.D., Bishop of Antigonish, who was a member of the Maritime delegation, addressed the pilgrims at Moncton prior to their departure for their respective homes from the railway city yesterday.

Bishop E. A. LeBlanc and Rev. E. P. Reynolds were at the Union Depot yesterday afternoon to welcome the returning party.

Speaking chronologically of the program of the congress, Father Duke said that Monday, June 21, was devoted to the children; Tuesday morning to the lady pilgrims; Tuesday evening to the men; Wednesday to the youth of high school age and Thursday to everybody.

MASS OF THE ANGELS. The Mass of the Angels at which 60,000 sang, on Monday, Father Duke described as marvelous. The vast multitudes had little difficulty in hearing every word of the sermons, hymns and other songs as large numbers of amplifiers were scattered over the field at Mundelein, where the throngs gathered. Many amplifiers were taken to the altar of the Mundelein cathedral.


Referring to the 60,000 children who sang the "Mass of the Angels" Tuesday, Father Duke remarked that they were dressed in white with a touch of yellow, yellow and white being the papal colors. Father Duke said the children resembled a huge field covered with white and yellow flowers.

STRIKING EVENT. "Perhaps the most striking event of the congress program was the gathering of the men on Tuesday night," Father Duke continued. "When all were together they arose as one and sang the Star Spangled Banner with fervent patriotic enthusiasm."

Speaking of the church dignitaries, who addressed the throngs Tuesday evening, Father Duke said that the Spanish cardinal, a personal representative of the King of Spain, was the most striking.

His eloquence was such as to keep the pilgrims spell-bound," Father Duke remarked.

OLDEST FARMER IN MISSOURI

Missouri's oldest farmer is getting ready for "old age."

He is Ben F. Dodge, who lives by himself in a little log cabin 10 miles north of Poplar Bluff. "Uncle Ben," as he is known, is 103 years of age. He has a Bible with the family history to prove it.

"I bought 40 acres of land four years ago," says "Uncle Ben," "and I am clearing it up so that when I get old I can rent it out and live off the returns. I don't expect to get old for 10 years yet."

"Uncle Ben" smokes a pipe all the time, and has since he was seven years old. He grows his own tobacco and refuses absolutely to use "tobacco made" cigars or tobacco. He drinks coffee three times a day and before prohibition he enjoyed his little nip.

"I can get along without it," he says, "but I did miss it for a while."

He died at 1 o'clock this morning in the City Hospital following an operation after an illness of four days. He was a native of Moncton, Maine, and began his railroad career on the old St. Croix and Penobscot, now part of the Maine Central. He left that road and ran on the C. N. R. for 38 years before retiring and was well known all over the system having run between Moncton and Saint John for many years. He retired 11 years ago.

His wife and one daughter, Mrs. J. B. Connolly of Moncton, and one son, Martin, assistant electrical superintendent of Corner Brook Pulp and Paper mill, Newfoundland, and one brother, George, of Milltown, Maine, also survive.

Here To Buy For Pulp Mill In N. S. The Caledonia, N. S., manufacturing mill having been destroyed by fire a week ago today, A. W. Broughton, president and general manager of the concern, arrived in the city last night to make arrangements for the purchase of new machinery for the plant. Mr. Broughton expects to leave for Boston tonight to confer with his representatives there.

Mr. Broughton said that the mill employed 25 people and he personally felt the loss sustained when the plant burned down. He hopes to have the new mill built by the first of the year. The Caledonia concern is a subsidiary of the Scott Paper Co., Chester, Penn. Mr. Broughton is registered at the Admiral Beatty.
