### REFUSES BAIL FOR SON HELD AS A FORGER

Engineer Says That Jail Will Teach Atlantic City Prisoner a Lesson. Atlantic City, April 15.—In default of \$2,000 bail, Nathan Kramer, nineteen-year-old son of Max J. Kramer, wealthy construction engineer of New York City, was placed in the city jail charged with forging his father's name to two checks for \$150 each. According to the police, his father refused to furnish bail on the ground that he had recently supplied \$5,500 to get him out of another scrape. "Let him stay in jail," his father is said to have told the police over the telephone. "It will teach him a lesson."

Nathan arrived in Atlantic City a week ago. With him were a man and his wife, whose names the authorities and the Ambassador Hotel management, where they are stopping, refuse to reveal. The young man, according to the police, has been a habitué of cabarets here.

The alleged forger is alleged to have been drawn on the Colonial Bank, New York City, and to have been presented at the Ambassador Hotel. Magistrate Joseph S. Tasson has set the hearing for Friday night.

The boy's father, according to the police, has constructed many theatres for sale by the Dominion government. Tenders are to be in the hands of the deputy minister of the naval service in Ottawa before noon on May 1. The steamer is an iron steamer of 180 tons, and the Armentieres a steel vessel of 307 tons.
