CHAULNES FALLS: 30 VILLAGES TAKEN.

Paris, Aug. 28-Chaulnes has been occupied by French troops, according he official statement issued today by the war office.

Since yesterday, thirty villages have been taken by them. Among the larger villages taken by the French are Omiecourt, about two miles east of Chaulnes; Balatre, three miles northeast of Roye; Reiglise, a mile and three-quarters southeast of Roye toward Noyon, and Verpillieres, south of

"North and south of the Avre we have occupied Chaulnes, Omiecourt, Balatre, Reiglise and Verpillieres. Further south we have penetrated into the wood of Crapesumesnil and have taken Dives.

U-BOAT VICTIMS

Thirty-Eight Lives Lost With French Steamer

With the French Army in France, Aug. 27—(Fe the Associated Press, evening)—A civity behind the German lines on the Aisne and the Avre fronts has increased greatly since the French successes around Roye, and on the plateau north of Soissons. In the region east of Roye the Germans seem to be preparing for an eventual retirement. The French have reached Amy, two miles southeast of Roye.

London, Aug. 28—Details of the sinking of the French steamer Lydiana off the north coast of Spain on July 16, show that the crew of the German submarine deliberately murdered most of the thirty-eight persons lost. They were only eight survivors out of the forty-six of crew and passengers on board the vessel.

The submarine torpedoed the vessel without warning, killing several of the forty-six vessel.

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After finally disposing of the Lydiana by shell fire, the submarine made a sixth and successful attempt to ram the raft, amid laughter from the U-boat's captain and crew.
