**AMATEURS SCORE
A GREAT SUCCESS
IN OPERA HOUSE**
Servant in the House Presented in
Excellent Manner and Good
Work is Keenly Appreciated

The first presentation of Charles R. Ken-
edy's play, the Servant in the House, by
the Loyalist Dramatic Club in the Opera
House last night, under the patronage of
His Worship the Mayor and the common
council was a distinct success. The per-
formance ran smoothly and the work
throughout showed painstaking study, re-
flecting much credit on the members of
the cast.

The play, which is one of the present
day, is among the strongest in point of re-
ligious teaching that has been seen here
for a long time. In the leading role that
of Manassah, Fred C. Macmillan scored a
complete success. The part is far from easy
and is rather exacting in demands, but
Mr. Macmillan lost not a single opportunity
and his work was highly appreciated.

Robert E. Walker gave a faithful and
most creditable portrayal of Robert Smith,
a gentleman of necessary occupation, while
Frank J. Carr appeared to excellent ad-
vantage in the role of James Tonsbury
Mackay, Bishop of Lancashire.

J. L. Robertson made an excellent vicar
and Mrs. Macmillan as Annie, the vicar's
wife, was thoroughly at home in a rather
difficult part giving an excellent concep-
tion of an ambitious, though not particu-
larly spiritual woman.

In the dainty juvenile role, Mary, niece
of the vicar's wife, Miss Marjorie King
scored a decided triumph, her work betray-
ing little, if anything, of the amateur.

A. Gordon Blumie made the most of the
opportunity as Rogers, the page boy and
was accorded a hearty reception.

It is worthy of note that the acting, all
the way through was perfectly natural,
giving the impression of the professional,
rather than amateur work. The stage set-
ting was in excellent taste and the pro-
duction as a whole highly appreciated, be-
ing by long odds one of the best amateur
performances given in St. John for some
time.

P. E. ISLAND IS AFTER CAR WORKS

Will Ask Dominion Govern-
ment to Construct Them
in Charlottetown

BOARD OF TRADE MEETING

President Higgs Puts Forward
Several Projects for Booming
Things in the Province—Peat
Development is One of Them

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Jan. 12.—At the
annual meeting of the board of trade held
on Wednesday evening President R. T.
Higgs said the island should, with a car-
rery service develop rapidly and become
a trans-shipping center for the Magdalen
Islands and many ports in the north. It
should also place us in a position to estab-
lish industries, which can supply the home
market and export the surplus in compe-
tition with outside manufacturers.

President Higgs advocated the giving of
publicity to our advantages as a shipping
center and encouraging manufacturers to
locate in this province. The starting of
a car ferry would give us an opportunity
to the government to enlarge their work-
shops in Charlottetown for the purpose of
building rolling stock for the railways on
the mainland and would provide employ-
ment to hundreds of men as contracts are
given for thousands of cars and he saw
no reason why the island should not re-
ceive a share for this province could have
the cars manufactured in Charlottetown.

He also advocated that steps be taken to
obtain accurate statistics as to the trade
of the island.

Mr. Higgs referred to the large deposits
of peat in this province. In one section
alone there were 1,777,283 tons in sight.
The dominion government undertook to
develop the peat bogs of Ontario and pro-
ved that the peat of that province could
be profitably prepared. He suggested that
the government be petitioned to establish
an experimental peat plant in this prov-
ince.

The fisheries of this province were very
valuable and should be susceptible of much
further development. If the car ferry was
placed in operation and facilities were
provided for shipping our fresh fish in re-
frigeration cars to the mainland, the prov-
ince would be benefited in the past by
agricultural immigrants coming here and
he suggested that the government should
take steps to encourage fishermen from
the British Isles to come here also.

The following resolution was unanimously
passed:

Whereas, industries in this province are
few and these we have are not flourishing,
due to the want of continuous communi-
cation winter and summer, and for this reason
our workmen seek employment else-
where to the great detriment of the prov-
ince; and whereas, the dominion government
has recently stated that the dominion ex-
acted from this province the fulfillment of every con-
dition of the confederation but that the
dominion government had failed on its
part to carry out the most important part
of the contract—that of continuous com-
munication, winter and summer—and are
therefore responsible for the condition of
our industries and decreasing population
therefore,

Resolved, that, as offering employment
to 200 men the dominion government be
asked to construct large and modern rail-
way works, locomotives, cars and other
rolling stock for the proposed standardized
gauge of the P. E. I. Railway which would
be changed when the car ferry was built.

LOST DIAMOND FOUND IN GIZZARD OF CHICKEN

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 12.—After reposing
three months in an impromptu jewel case
in the form of a chicken's gizzard, a
marriage ring diamond, belonging to E. M.
Reel, a motion picture machine operator
of Spokane, has been restored to its owner.
Reel lost the gem, which is valued at \$75,
from its setting in a ring he wore, while
working in the yard at his residence. The
chicken swallowed it and lodged in the
gizzard.

In the meantime Reel gave up his search
for the gem, concluding it was lost for-
ever. He was, however, very anxious to
find it for all time. A few days ago he
went to the henhouse and killed the fowl
for dinner. Mrs. Reel was cleaning it
when she found the missing diamond.

WOMAN MURDERED; HUSBAND ARRESTED

Syrian Stabbed Twenty-Six Times
With Dagger in Marseilles Hotel
Which She Managed

Marseilles, Jan. 12.—Stabbed twenty-six
times with a Turkish dagger, a young woman
expired here in a hotel for emigrants,
of which she was the manager. The po-
lice suspect her husband to have commit-
ted the crime during a fit of madness.

The victim, Mme. Myriam Jangochian,
was a Syrian by birth. She arrived in Mar-
seilles with her husband, Alexander Jangochian,
and her daughter, aged six, about
eight months ago. They intended to emi-
grate to America, but Alexander took a
liking to Marseilles and accepted a situa-
tion as waiter in the hotel where the trag-
edy took place.

Lately Mme. Jangochian, a woman of
remarkable intelligence, was appointed
manager and the family lived on the sec-
ond floor of the hotel. Toward seven
o'clock cries for help were heard from
their private apartment. They were ut-
tered by Alexander, who told the persons
who responded that he had just found
his wife brutally assassinated.

In the bedroom which was bespattered
with blood was the young woman's body.
Her clothing was disordered, and around
her neck and ankles were strong cords
tightly bound. It was evident that she
had not succumbed without a terrible
struggle.

AUSTRALIAN STATE BANK IS ABOUT TO BECOME A FACT

Dream of Labor Party Soon To Be
Realized By Legislation of Fisher
Government

Melbourne, Jan. 12.—The long cherished
dream of the Australian labor party, the
creation of an Australian state bank, com-
peting with private banks and providing
the labor government with a powerful fi-
nancial arm, is about to be realized.

The Fisher ministry has brought in a
measure establishing the institution and
already the private banks are talking of
amalgamation and unions to meet the
new rival. The scheme has, as at present
outlined few alarming features. It pro-
vides, however, for a savings bank branch
which must seriously compete with the
savings banks of the six state govern-
ments and attract therefrom a consid-
erable portion of the spare cash of the thrif-
ty working classes.

The capital of the bank, which is to be
raised by debentures, convertible into in-
scribed stock, is fixed at \$5,000,000. The
management is placed in the hands of a
governor and a deputy governor. The
commonwealth revenues are to guarantee
the advance of the bank. Half-yearly bal-
ance-sheets are to be laid before the fed-
eral parliament. The commonwealth treas-
urer is to be supplied by the governor with
quarterly statements of assets and liabil-
ities.

With the exception of the issue of bank
notes—which monopoly is still retained by
the commonwealth government's treasury
department—the new bank is to fulfill all
the functions of a lending and financing
machine. Advances may be made on any
security which its management deems
sound.


