TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION

Cleveland, O., Aug. 15—A bold but unsuccessful attack was made by the "Progressives" in the International Typographical Union's convention today upon the alleged autocracy of the administration. President James M. Lynch himself took the floor in opposition to the "Progressive" proposal to appoint a board of eighteen directors who would be given much of the power now wielded by the president and the executive council of three.

For fifteen minutes a demonstration for Lynch continued on the conclusion of his

speech and shortly after the convention defeated the board proposition overwhelmingly. The ladies auxiliary of the union is still in turmoil. Tonight the main body is awaiting the return of the books by Mrs. Frank W. Long, secretary and treasurer, who walked out of the convention followed by a small coterie, because her choice for stenographer was not of the auxiliary.

ONE OF THE BEST MUSICAL COMEDIES EVER SEEN HERE

"The Red Rose" Everything That Was Expected of it and More — Large Audience Waxed Enthusiastic Over Splendid Production

"One of the very best musical comedies that has visited St. John for a long time" was the almost unanimous opinion of the large and fashionable audience that attended the opening performance of "The Red Rose" in the Opera House last night. The play is truly a Broadway success, and it won instant favor with the local audience. From the rise of the curtain until its fall on the last act the audience was kept in a constant state of uproar by the work of the four comedians in the piece. The songs introduced during the action of the piece were very catchy and the stage settings were of the highest order.

Special mention should be made of the costumes worn by members of the company, and the stage settings. The chorus, composed of about twenty good-looking young ladies, was dressed in some very exquisite costumes, including the hobbleskirt, the harem skirt and several other 20th century gowns. The principals also wore costumes that were exceedingly pretty, the harem skirt being in much prominence. The gowns blended well with the stage settings and lights and made a very charming spectacle. As to the stage settings, it would not be exaggerating to say that they were the best that have been carried by any musical comedy company that has travelled in this direction. The settings last night were excellent, even the minutest details being attended to. The first act, the Art School in Paris, shows the Eiffel tower in the distance, it being outlined with incandescent lights at night. The second act represents the Baron's chateau, with its beautiful garden, its floral decorations and its general magnificence. The third act represents the ball-room of the Four Arts, and is especially artistically arranged, and reflects great credit on the stage manager. Every scene in the production is of the highest standard and called forth much applause from the audience when the curtain rose on each act.

Miss Zoe Barnett, the prima donna, as Lola, the artist's model did excellent work, and showed herself to be a very clever actress and soloist. Beside being the possessor of a very pleasing voice she is an exceptionally clever dancer and was heartily applauded for her work last night. Her heaviest acting is at the end of the second act, and last night she was forced to respond to three curtain calls. Her chief solos are:—"I Want to be Queen of Vanity Fair," "Come Along My Cherie," "Love and Beauty," and "Men, Men, Men."

The most of the comedy work was attended to by Walter H. Catlett as Raphael Spiegel, a German picture dealer. His German dialect was perfect and his every movement and saying was greeted with bursts of laughter. He reminds one of Jack Henderson, when he played "Hans Nix" in "The Telephone Girl." Mr. Catlett has not much solo work to do, but what he lacks as a singer he makes up for in his comedy work. He was positively the principal fun maker. His several dances with his partner, Miss Mary, were very funny. He was assisted in his work by Miss Charlotte Philbrick in the role of Miss Joyant, and by Miss Mary Darcy, an American Millionaire, and Charles M. Clear, as Hon. Lionel Talboys, an English Chaplain. In the fun-making line they had many scenes together and they provoked much laughter by their work. Laura Jeffray, as David Reese, and she is the possessor of a fine tenor voice, and uses it to good advantage in his solo work. Laura Jeffray, as Gyp, her own master, also did excellent work in making the production a success, and sang several solos very acceptably. Russell Lennon, in the role of Dick Lorrimer, the model's artist, was admirably adapted to the part, and his numbers with Miss Barnett, particularly "Come Along My Cherie," were thoroughly enjoyed.

The chorus work was also of a high order. The members of the chorus, besides having good looks in abundance, can sing and dance well, and have ample opportunities to display their talents, for the piece abounds in chorus work. The most popular musical numbers of the piece are "Come Along My Cherie," "I'd Like to Go on a Honeymoon with You," "The Queen of Vanity Fair," and "Men, Men, Men." The latter piece was especially pretty, being sung by Miss Barnett and the male members of the company.

Taken all in all the production was a big success and reflects great credit on the management. Great praise is also due to Howard A. Cook, the Musical Director, and Herbert S. Burns, the Stage Manager.

The play will be repeated tonight and tomorrow night with a Scotchman makes it is safe to say that all three performances will be largely attended.

The recent heavy rains have occasioned fresher conditions about harbor and in the river. The river has risen five feet at South Bay.

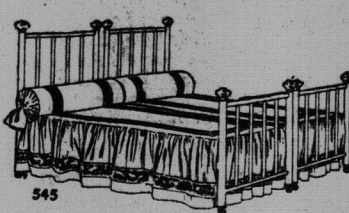

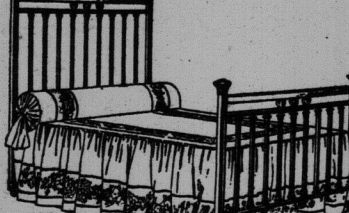

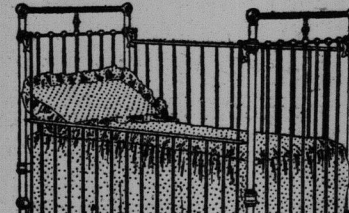
