

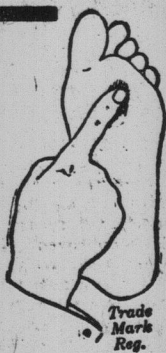

### NEWS OF OUR SOLDIERS

Mrs. Louise Lawlor of Newcastle has been advised that her son, Lieut. Frank Lawlor, who crossed overseas with the 182nd battalion, died on April 7 as the result of being gassed.

Pte. Thomas Titus, yesterday reported wounded, is a son of Mrs. Peter Titus, 180 Hawthorne avenue.

Chatham has received word of the death of Private Hubert Hawkes in action. He went overseas with the New Brunswick battalion. He is survived by his widowed mother and several brothers and sisters. Among the former is Father Hawkes, priest of Berthouge.

Lewis Millett of Windsor has been advised that his son, Lieut. Noble Millett, was killed in an air raid in France. He was a flight lieutenant and was twenty-two years old. He had been reported missing since March 18.

Corporal H. D. Wetmore, son of the late Captain H. D. Wetmore of Clifton, in a letter to his mother recounts some of his experiences at the various parts of the battle line. He went overseas with Major Allen's battery and after a few weeks in the firing line he was wounded but returned to the front just prior to the battle of Vimy Ridge. He is now in England on leave. He says that four of the battery signallers were awarded the military medal and that he was one of them.

London, Mar. 18.—(Correspondence Associated Press).—Large contracts will soon be placed in England for supplies of boots to the American army in France. In anticipation of these requirements, leather supplies to manufacturers of civilian shoes have been curtailed and stringent restrictions will come into force early next month.

### HALIFAX Y.W.C.A. WANTS A \$200,000 BUILDING

That there should be in Halifax a building costing \$200,000, where the work of the Y. W. C. A. could be conducted on something the same lines for girls as the Y. M. C. A. does for young men and soldiers, was the point of an address by Miss Glass, delivered at Government House last week before a meeting of men and women interested in the work. Miss Glass is the secretary of the Halifax Y. W. C. A. and began by telling of the establishing of the first Y. W. C. A. in London in 1855. The splendid work being done by the English Y. W. C. A. in the camp and on the battlefield was emphasized by Miss Glass. The women behind the men who were behind the guns. Then she spoke of what the Y. W. C. A. is doing in Canada, in war work and in other directions.

Finally the operations of the association in Halifax were considered, the need there is for expansion and the pressing call from those young women who have only the room they board in, with no means for recreation outside—the urgent call from such as those for a place of innocent recreation and where leisure may be spent.

The present quarters are utterly inadequate in every way. A building properly equipped to meet the social, physical, spiritual and mental requirements, must be provided. It must be on a prominent street and would cost \$200,000.

Herbert Stairs of Wolfville pointed out that while such a building is a necessity for Halifax, it also is a necessity for the province—it would serve as a provincial no less than as a city factor for good.

### LOCAL NEWS

Leave of all sort is being dealt with carefully and charitably by the military authorities. Of 600 applications for leave in the last month figures show that only twenty-five per cent was granted. It is understood in military circles that there is a new order keeping in England all men in any manner fit to go to the front or to release another for front line work and not sending them back to Canada.

A meeting of the committee for the Red Triangle fund was held at campaign headquarters yesterday afternoon and G. Wetmore Merritt elected chairman with G. H. Hilyard as secretary. The sum of \$50,000 is set for St. John city and county. A. S. MacAllister, maritime director, arriving in the city yesterday, said that a similar organization had been formed in Prince Edward Island, and that the movement was well under way in Nova Scotia.

That the Miller mills at Pokok will be in operation immediately is the announcement made by Harry J. Garson, the new owner, yesterday. Mr. Garson said that the line kilns should be in operation by next week, if all goes well and that he intends to start the lumber mills just so soon as he can contract for a supply of logs and have them delivered. He expects to give employment to seventy-five or one hundred men at the mills during the summer months. This announcement will be good news for a large number of families who have been dependent on the mills for support in other years.

The American steamship which was burned off the coast of Nova Scotia on Saturday night was identified in New York yesterday as the City of Winnipeg, of 3,500 tons gross, bound from a southern port to France with a cargo of cotton and flour.

In addition to Fred Gougin of Le Gre's Corner, Coeline Bourgeois of Moncton is dead as the result, it is said, of drinking wood alcohol.

**FOUR MILLION ACRES MORE IN CROP IN 1918**  
Half in Western Provinces and Nearly a Million Acres in Ontario.

Victoria, April 16.—Prof. W. J. Black, Commissioner administering the Agricultural Instruction Act, estimates there will be an addition of 4,000,000 acres under crop in Canada this year, as compared with 1917. Half will be in the provinces east of the Great Lakes—probably nearly a million acres in Ontario, 600,000 in Quebec, where many of the grass lands are being broken up, and 400,000 in the maritime provinces. Of the 2,000,000 acres in the western provinces about half will be in Saskatchewan.

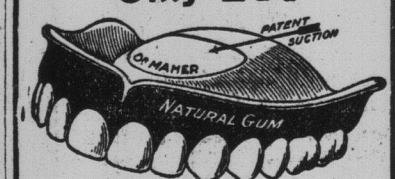

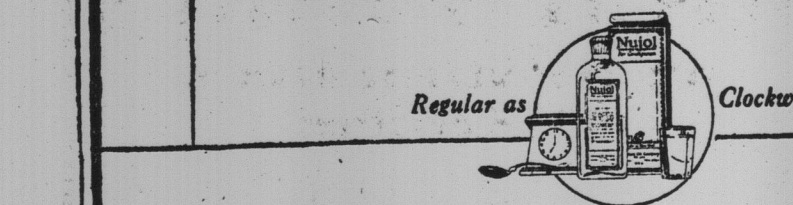
