# THREE DROWNED

Only Survivor Clings Two Nights and a Day to Upturned Boat

Quebec, Oct. 29-After clinging for two nights and a day to the mast of an upturned sailing boat, Alphonse Dion, of St. John, Island of Orleans, was saved when the craft was washed ashore near St. Laurent, Island of Orleans. When the half-drowned man had been given first aid and was able to tell his story, he horrified his hearers by telling them of a tragedy. Three of his companions, Pierer Dion, Jos. Dion and F. X. Dion, were drowned when their boat The four men, according to the story told by the rescued shipwrecked young man, had left St. Laurent in a thirtyman, had left St. Laurent in a thirty-five-foot sailing boat to go to Quebec. As they were abreast of the dangerous Beaumont reefs or rock ledge, a false manoeuvre drove the frail craft upon the obstruction. The bottom of the boat was surfashed and at the same time the boat turned over on its side, throwing the four occupants into the cold waters of the river. Pierre, Joseph and F. X. Dion sank, and, although they came to the surface twice, their companion, who was himself battling for life, could not

assist them in any way and had to give up any attempt of rescue. Alphonse Dion, the man who was saved, clung desperately to the mast of the overturned boat and managed to reach the side of the craft where he remained until the current and the wind had pushed the wreck to the shores of the island.
