THE COMING PLEBISCITE.

The plebiscite vote on the prohibition question will take place on the 29th of September, and the fight is now in full blast throughout the Dominion.

So far as The Expositor is concerned, its sympathies in this, as in previous contests of the kind, are on the side of prohibition.

At the same time, its columns will be thrown open to the full and impartial discussion of the issues involved, whether the arguments be advanced pro or con.

Prohibition has not yet been tried under circumstances similar to those under which it is proposed to make the test in Canada.

It is not to be expected that any prohibitory legislation we may have will totally stop the sale of intoxicating liquors, even as no law against crimes or misdemeanors stops the commission of such offences.

Under such circumstances, we can afford to make the experiment of total prohibition if a satisfactory majority of the people show the adoption of this course to have a reasonable measure of popular support.

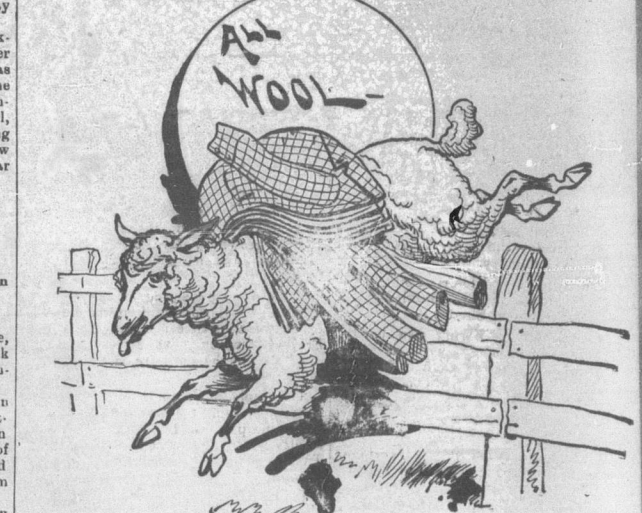
