About 40 paviers on Dalhousie street, Bramford, went on strike on Tuesday.

The C.P.R. and C.N.R. claim there will be no grain blockade in the west this year.

Michael White, 46 years old and unmarried, was killed by a fall of coal at Glace Bay.

The Dominion Cabinet will meet on Friday afternoon, and will meet daily for a fortnight.

The Junction of the T. & N. O. with the G. T. P. will be eight miles west of Abitibi crossing.

Frost In Manitoba. Winnipeg, July 31.—The extremely hot weather of the past week has brought the grain on with a rush, probably too fast for the best results, and rain is now badly needed all over the country.

Heavy storms have visited some sections of the west, accompanied by hail and the temperature took a decided drop. Frost was reported yesterday morning from Emerson and several other points, but no damage is reported.

The crop is not going to be as heavy as was expected early in the season, but will be equal to if not above the average.

Accidental Shooting. Ingersoll, July 31.—In Dereham Township Sydney Haycock, the 3-year-old son of Jefferson Haycock, was shot by his brother, who was handling a .32 calibre rifle. The bullet entered his head behind the left ear.

Drowned While Bathing. Medford, July 31.—Joseph F. Fitzgerald, aged 16, was drowned while bathing in the river with other boys. He was unable to swim, and got beyond his depth.

Dies on Road. Glace Bay, July 31.—J. J. Pembroke, a well-known butcher of Lingan, was found dead yesterday morning on the road leading from Dominion to Lingan. He was sitting by the wagon. The horse remained with him all night. Heart failure was likely the cause of death.

Sir William Safe. St. John's, Nfld., July 31.—Sir William MacGregor, Governor of Newfoundland, concerning whose safety much anxiety had been felt since the news was received of the terrific storm which swept the coast of Labrador on Tuesday, is safe.

Slight Discrepancy. Winnipeg, July 31.—It is claimed by the city engineer that there has been a mistake involving nearly half a million dollars in the bookkeeping accounts of the high pressure plant, and that it has not actually cost much over half what is charged to it.

Incendiary Fire. Cranbrook, B.C., July 31.—At a fire incident yesterday Government Agent Armstrong proved the fire in Warden the other day, destroying two blocks, to be of incendiary origin.

Ottawa's Population. Ottawa, July 31.—The new city directory puts the population of Ottawa at 85,443.

Thursday Evening, July 30. Liverpool wheat futures closed today 3/4 to 3/8 higher than yesterday, and corn futures 3/4 higher.

At Chicago Sept. wheat closed 3/4 higher than yesterday. Sept. corn 3/4 higher and Sept. oats 3/4 higher.

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Steady—Hogs Up 5c to 10c at Chicago and Buffalo.

LONDON, July 30.—London cables for cattle are steady, at 11 1/2 to 12 1/2c per pound, dressed weight, refrigerator beef is quoted at 10 1/2 to 10 3/4c per pound.

Toronto Live Stock. TORONTO, July 30.—Receipts as reported by the railways for Wednesday and Thursday were 25 calves, 100 hogs, 2016 sheep and lambs, 254 calves and 1 horse.

Exporters. There were none here, it was a few odd cattle picked up of loads of butchers, and these sold from 25 to 25 1/2c for bulls, 25 to 25 1/2c for cows.

Butchers. The best picked butchers' cattle sold at 4 1/2 to 5c; good, 4 1/4 to 4 3/4c; medium, 4 1/4 to 4 3/4c; common, 4 1/4 to 4 3/4c; cows, 4 1/4 to 4 3/4c; calves, 4 1/4 to 4 3/4c.

Feeders and Stockers. There was a limited number of stockers and feeders changed hands. Stockers, 100 to 100 lbs., each, at 22 1/2 to 23c; feeders, 80 to 100 lbs., each, at 22 1/2 to 23c.

Milkers and Springers. The market for good milkers was strong at 140 to 150, and one was reported at 160. Common to medium cows, sold at 130 to 140 each.

Veal Calves. Since lambs have become plentiful and cheaper, calves are not as much in demand. Prices ranged from 25 to 25 1/2c per cwt., with some few choice quality calves at 26.

Sheep and Lambs. Export sheep are firm, and lambs are much cheaper; in fact they were hard to cash. Export, mixed, 22 1/2 to 23c; lambs, 25 to 26 per cwt. Wesley Dunn, who bought 100 lambs, quoted the average price at 25 1/2 per cwt.

Hogs. No change in prices. Mr. Harris quotes selects at 16 1/2 and lights 15 1/2, fed and watered at the market.
