CLOTHING PROFITS FIXED. The Board of Commerce at To-ronto on Friday issued an order after agreement with local clothing deal-ers, prohibiting a gross profit of more than 33 1-3 per cent, on sales wear and partly ready

to-wear clothing. On less expensive suits, costing the retailer under \$25, the board allows even a smaller margin of profit, namely 25 per cent maximum. Out of this gross profit the retailer must pay his rent, taxes, salaries, etc., and provide for depreciation and other overhead contingencies. The order goes into effect in To-ronto.
