IN PROSPEROUS CONDITION.

Annual Reports Submitted at Convention of Catholic Mutual Benefit Association.

Montreal, Que., Aug. 27.—About four hundred and fifty delegates from over the Dominion, were present at the opening session of the fourteenth convention of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association of Canada this morning. At the afternoon session M. F. Hickey, grand president, delivered his inaugural address, reviewing the work of the association since the last convention, and congratulating the delegates on the prosperous condition of the association. Grand Secretary Benham presented his report for the three years ending June 30th, 1907. The first branch of the C. M. B. A. was established in Windsor on February 11th, 1878. There are at present 104 active branches and 22,000 members. Since the last convention three years ago, sixty new branches have been organized and over 5,000 members initiated. The association has a reserve of \$236,615. Since the last convention there has been received by the grand secretary from branches \$1,108,304. During the present period there has been paid to beneficiaries of deceased members \$944,947.87.

THE PITTSBURG FAILURE.

President Transfers Wheat Land to Receiver to Be Used in Paying Depositors.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 28.—President Walter S. Moore, of the defunct Oregon Trust and Savings Bank, has announced his intention of selling conditionally, to Receiver T. C. DeWing, 60,000 acres of wheat land in Sherman and Billings counties to be used in paying the depositors of that bank. The land is said to be valued at \$300,000.

THE BANK FAILURE.

Police Are Inquiring Into Death of Mrs. Hucker, Who Was Killed By a Lion.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 28.—A rigid investigation started to-day by the police department and the coroner of Allegany county into the death of Mrs. Hucker, who was injured by a lion at Luna park yesterday, resulted in the arrest to-day of Clarence Chappel, 19 years old, who had been committed to jail as a witness. Chappel cleaned the lion's cage. Three women who were with Mrs. Hucker when the beast attacked her are under the care of physicians.

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INGENIOUS FAKE SCHEME FRUSTRATED

Recent Arrival From the Old Country Arrested By the Police at Toronto.

Toronto, Aug. 28.—Abraham Callendar, a recent arrival in this city from the Old Country via Montreal, was arrested last night on a charge of vagrancy, arising from complaints that he was using the advertising columns of a local evening paper for fraudulent purposes. This advertisement was inserted: "Young gentleman, for good position in Europe. Fine climate, no winters." Applicants were informed that they were offered a position as agents for a steamship company at Alexandria, with a salary of \$250 a year, free passage out and two servants, with a free house out. As a guarantee of good faith, however, a deposit of \$100 was required. Most of the applicants departed at the latter condition, and a check of the names reported to the local detective department. Detectives Kennedy and McMillan found the printer of the advertisement with a well known business man at Hamilton's Point.

When questioned, he admitted that the scheme was a fake, but pleaded that he had not been able to secure any money by it. He had exactly thirty cents in money on him. There were, however, two interesting letters in his possession. One was from an official of King Edward's household acknowledging birthday congratulations in 1906, and the other was from Lord Knollys, His Majesty's private secretary, refusing to allow Callendar the use of the Royal Arms. In inquiry the detectives have made they understand that Callendar is a discharged cook from the steamer Montrose, on which he worked his passage out to Canada.

BEGINS LIFE SENTENCE.

Barrington Has Been Removed to Penitentiary at Jefferson City.

St. Louis, Aug. 28.—"Lord" Frederick Seymour Barrington was to-day taken in an automobile from the Clayton jail, where he has been confined for four years and two months, to the Union station and conveyed to Jefferson City, where he begins his life sentence in the penitentiary for the murder of James P. McGany. Barrington was handcuffed for the first time since his arrest in 1903. Thomas J. Morgan was also taken to Jefferson City to serve a sentence of 20 years for murder. Barrington was under sentence to be hanged here last Monday, but Governor Folk finally commuted the penalty to life imprisonment.

FRENCH DIVORCES INCREASE.

From 1,879 in 1884 to 16,240 in 1906—Cruelly Chief Cause.

Since the revival of legal divorces in France in 1884 there has been such an increase in the number of those who have severed their marriage bonds that politicians are wondering where it will stop. In 1884 there were 1,879 divorces; twenty years later the number was 14,882; last year there were 16,240. In the statistics just issued by the French Minister of Justice, it is, however, noteworthy that by far the greatest proportion of divorces has been granted on the score of cruelty and the like. Thus those divorces amounted in 1884 to 1,477 and in 1906 to 10,667. In the latter year the divorces granted on the application of husbands for breach of what is called the marital Commandment were 2,284, those on the petition of wives being 1,507. In 1884 they had been 26 and 97 respectively. Then, in 1884, there were only 16 divorces owing to the condemnation of one of the parties to an infamous penalty numbered 20. In 1894 they had risen to 28.

DIED FROM INJURIES.

Woman Who Was Attacked by Lion Has Passed Away.

Pittsburg, Aug. 28.—Mrs. Anna A. Hucks, who was attacked at Luna park, an amusement resort, yesterday, by a large lion which escaped from one of the side shows, succumbed to-day from her injuries. BUY SITE FOR YARDS.

Great Northern Railway Company Has Secured Land in New Westminster.

A considerable portion of the property used by the Royal City Planning Mills for lumber yards has been transferred by that company to the Great Northern Railway, an announcement to this effect having been made by a prominent member of the mill company yesterday, says the New Westminster News. No statement has yet been made by the railway company as to what will be constructed on the property, but it is understood that the site will be used for freight sheds and railway yards. Plans of the proposed yards have already been filed, and construction work will be commenced within the next couple of weeks. The E. C. Mills Timber and Trading Company has already commenced removing the lumber from the area which extends from Tenth to Twelfth streets, and from the B. C. Electric Railway to Columbia street. Prominent officials of the Great Northern Railway were here from Seattle and St. Paul last week for the purpose of holding a meeting with the local officials and plans along that to proceed. Among them were Chief Engineer Hogleland and Assistant Engineer Stewart, of Seattle. While here the officials inspected the route of the proposed line from Abbotford to Chilliwack, which it is understood will eventually become part of the proposed Coast-Kootenay line.

IN CRITICAL CONDITION.

Winipeg, Aug. 28.—Word was received in this city to-day that E. A. James, former manager of the Canadian Northern lines in the West, suffered from a paralytic stroke at Mount Clemens, Michigan, and is in a critical condition, having lost the use of his lower limbs. The only law passed at the recent session of the Manitoba legislature, which has received the royal assent, has been proclaimed at Pyriwald Hill, in accordance with the custom for 1,000 years. The law abolishes the compulsory viewing of bodies by coroners' juries.
