AMERICAN BROTHERS HAS STUDIED HOUSING PROBLEM.

Working Man.
To an ingenious Scotchman goes the credit of being the first person to harness a mouse and make him a money-making factor. He was David Hutton, a native of Dunfermline, and a spinner of thread.
In 1818 he visited Perth and among the toys and trinkets manufactured by the French prisoners there, he was attracted by a little toy mouse with a wheel in the tail of the tail which he rapidly adopted, impelled by the gravity of a common house mouse.
Hutton purchased the mouse, mouse and wheel, took them home and set the tiny rodent to work.
The half-penny's worth of oatmeal was sufficient for his food for 38 days—during which time it ran 985 miles. He kept the mouse constantly engaged in the making of sewing thread for more than a year.
The thread mill was so constructed that the mouse was able to twist, twist and reel from 100 to 120 threads a day, Sunday and excepted. To perform a task it did with perfect ease every other day.
On the half-penny's worth of oatmeal, which lasted for five weeks, one of these little mice made 3,840 threads of 24 inches long, and as a penny was paid to women for every hank made in the ordinary way, the mouse at that rate earned 15 cents every six weeks.
Allowing for board and for machinery, there was a clear yearly profit from each mouse of \$1.50.
It was Mr. Hutton's intention to apply for the loan of the Dunfermline Cotton, which was empty, where he planned to set up 10,000 mouse mills and still leave room for the looper and several hundreds of operators; but this wonderful project was never carried out because of the inventor's sudden death.

Plot to Murder Kitchener.
The authorities at Scotland Yard are on the hunt for an Egyptian student who was lately at Oxford, and who is alleged to have been engineering a plot to assassinate Lord Kitchener, according to a story in the Daily Express. This student is the only one named in the story, and he is said to have been in London at the time of the National Egyptian Congress at London in 1910, denounced by President Roosevelt for stirring up England for alleged neglect of Egyptian affairs.
At the same congress, which was forbidden to meet on French territory, Lord Kitchener declared that the programme of the "Young Egypt" party consisted of two words, "Revolution" and "Constitution."

New South African Railway.
The new railway which links up the town of Beaufort West with Beaufort West, is now being opened for traffic, and is proving a great boon to the inhabitants of this progressive community. The line passes through a rich agricultural district which, besides, amongst other industries, a large cannery, the products of which have a high reputation throughout South Africa.

Rockie Man Trapped.
A neekie which had been dead people to hear has been produced by an ingenious inventor. The neekie is not because the picture is a few ones, says "Men's Wear," but it is because of a small electric motor, hidden in the back of the neekie, the transmitting sound to the ear by means of an electrostatic wire.
