

St. Peter's Colony

FULDA.—On Friday evening, August 1st, Father Prior Peter of Münster, in company with Messrs. B. Imhoff, Carl Zimmermann and A. P. Hinz motored out to Fulda, when Father Prior delivered to Father Lawrence a telegram from Abbot Oswald Baran, O.S.B., of St. Martin's Abbey, Lacey, State of Washington, containing the exceedingly sad intelligence that the Very Rev. Father Prior Wolfgang Steinkogler, O.S.B., the brother-priest of Rev. Father Lawrence, had died the same day (Aug. 1st) while at the altar. Father Lawrence was greatly shocked at this unexpected news, but with a brave heart resigned himself to the will of the Almighty. God's ways are inscrutable. — Father Prior Wolfgang was born at Ebensee, Austria, Oct. 9th 1860. In his youth he emigrated with the rest of the family and came to America, where they settled down in the Pierz district, in the state of Minnesota. He, together with his brother, soon gave proof of being called to the priesthood. Hence they asked for admittance at St. John's College, Collegeville, Minn., where in the course of time both joined the Benedictine Order and became monks. Both Fathers were raised to the priesthood the same year, Father Wolfgang having been ordained on the 2nd of July 1885 and Father Lawrence on the 19th of December 1885. When the Benedictine Fathers set out to found a new branch of their order in the state of Washington in the year 1895, Father Wolfgang cheerfully offered his services for the pioneer work. After the new foundation had been raised to the dignity of an Abbey, in 1914, the new Abbot recognizing the abilities and good qualities of Father Wolfgang, appointed him conventual Prior and, later on, also rector of the seminary, which positions he held up to his sudden death. — Interment of Prior Wolfgang took place at Lacey, Wash., in the monastic cemetery, yesterday, August 5th. The great distance and the nonsensical red tape at the boundary made it impossible for Father Lawrence to attend at the obsequies.

WAKAW.—The following cases came up before Philip Lepine, J.P., and J. H. Lewis, J.P.: Peter Thiel, John Thiel and F. Thiel, of Cudworth district, were found guilty of assault by trespass on Wm. Quinn and family and fined each \$20 and costs. Fred Thiel was summoned on a charge of stealing a tank from Wm. Quinn, both of the Cudworth district. Thiel was found guilty and ordered to restore the tank. He was released on a suspended sentence for one year. In both cases Sergt. Herrick, of the Provincial Police, prosecuted and J. G. Diefenbaker defended.

DANA.—John Budner, a farmer residing near Dana who was admitted to the City hospital at Saskatoon last Thursday suffering from a fractured skull which he sustained as a result of being beaten while on his way home from a dance Wednesday, is slightly improved and hope is held for his recovery, according to reports from the hospital.

BRUNO.—Mr. Zotique Dagenais who was operated at St. Elizabeth Hospital some time ago and who had to be operated again, last week, on account of an internal tumor, died on Aug. 1st, at the age of 45 years, and was buried at Bruno Aug. 4th. Nearly all the members of the Bruno parish attended the exequies, giving proof of the high esteem in which Mr. Dagenais was held. The deceased is survived by a sorrowing wife and four children of whom the oldest, a son, is 16 years of age, while the youngest had attained the age of three years on the day of the funeral. — Mrs.

Dagenais wishes to express her thanks to all who extended help during the illness of her husband and showed their sympathy in her sad bereavement.

HUMBOLDT.—Last Tuesday (July 29th) Mr. Peter Ehl, formerly of Carmel, who for the last two years had been living near Willmont died at the St. Elizabeth Hospital of dropsy at the age of 72 years. The funeral was held Thursday morning from St. Augustine's Church. The deceased is survived by his wife, his son, Mr. Albert Ehl of Humboldt, and several step-children.

—Last Saturday evening at 8 o'clock a fire, caused by the explosion of a gasoline stove, broke out in the dwelling-house of Land-Inspector Smyth, Livingstone Str., south of the track. Although the boys of the fire department by their hard work succeeded in putting out the fire before the building had burned to the ground, building and furniture are a complete loss. Also some valuable purebred dogs were burned to death.

—The Town of Humboldt has engaged Mr. F. W. D. Thompson, of Winnipeg, as its new town clerk, to succeed H. Dean Creed who resigned. He is engaged at a monthly salary of \$150.00 and assumed his new position Aug. 1st. Mr. Thompson is a returned soldier, being three years overseas, and was in France for 21 months. He was for a number of years manager of the Bank of British North America at Battleford and other points in Saskatchewan and comes to Humboldt with the highest recommendations. He is married and has a family of three children.

—The work of harvesting the crop in the Humboldt district has commenced, wheat cutting having started in one field on Saturday, July 26th, which is the earliest date on record in which wheat has been cut in this district.

—The excavation work for the new stalls and machine shop being built for the C. N. R. here has been completed and the concrete work was started last week.

—A new frame building 40x24 has been erected by Mr. H. Maney, on Franklin Ave., who will open up a second-hand store and auction room.

—The weather of the past week was very dry and warm up to Sunday. On Sunday night there fell a nice rain, which conducted much to refresh the gardens, potatoes and vegetables. Many of the wells in this district are showing a tendency of becoming dry. The farmers are getting ready to harvest their

barley and wheat, and some farmers started wheat cutting already last week. This is the first time in the history of St. Peter's Colony that wheat was so far advanced in the first part of August as to be ripe for cutting.

—A "troubled young man" from the western part of the Colony asks us for our advice in his perplexities, so that he may be able to ease his perturbed conscience. The best advice we can give him is to rely entirely on the good judgment of his Father Confessor whom God has deputed to be his spiritual guide. Golden Jubilee.

WESTPALIA, Iowa.—The golden jubilee of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Peter Brommenschenkel was celebrated on July 31, amid the congratulations of the whole parish. The program of Wednesday's evening's celebration included speeches, songs, plays, and the presentation of purses of over \$1,300 in gold, besides a substantial donation by the Daughters of Isabella, and other valuable gifts. Thursday morning a procession, headed by a band, escorted the jubilarian to the church for the celebration of a solemn High Mass. Since Msgr. Brommenschenkel has been pastor of the parish, 32 young ladies have entered the convent, 5 young men became priests, and several are even now nearing their ordination. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Brommenschenkel was celebrated, Rev. M. J. Kaufman of Centerville assisted as deacon and Rev. V. Stoll of Milo was sub-deacon. The Rev. Steiger of Earling was master of ceremonies. The English sermon was rendered by the Very Rev. F. P. McManus, dean of Council Bluffs. The German

sermon was preached by Rev. F.R. Schleicher. The clergy present included the Rt. Rev. Msgr. M. Flavin, Des Moines, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Geo. W. Heer of Dubuque, and a number of other priests. (St. Peter's Bote also joins in extending its heartiest wishes to Msgr. Brommenschenkel, since the Rt. Rev. Father Jubilarian has, on more than one occasion, proven his interest in the welfare of St. Peter's Abbey. The Rev. Father J. Steiger who is likewise mentioned in the above report, was formerly a member of St. Peter's Abbey, having been the first Monastery cook in the pioneer days of St. Peter's Colony. —Ed.)

SASKATOON, Sask., Aug. 5.—Lt. H. S. McClelland was caught in fog and rain on his trip to Mel-fort yesterday and had a bad crash. His mechanic, John Morrison, is now lying unconscious in the city hospital, but is not thought to be seriously hurt. Lt. McClelland sustained a few minor injuries. Lt. Under the clouds he found rain and fog, and when about 200 feet above the earth something happened—the pilot does not know just what, but thinks he struck a tree. Government gives Details.

among the original sellers in proportion to the grades and quantities sold. The farmer will thus receive the best world price for his wheat in a cash payment at time of his sale and a final payment when the wheat crop has been disposed of.

A complete system of record, under the provisions of the Canada Grain act and the regulations made thereunder, will be kept, which will enable the board to determine with accuracy and pay with certainty the exact proportion of the surplus due to each original seller.

The board will sell wheat to the millers and will sell the flour milled therefrom for export, while for domestic consumption the sales will be made as usual and the price will be restricted to a fixed maximum of reasonable profit, allowing within that maximum competition among the millers themselves.

The grain exchanges will not give facilities for the buying and selling of futures in wheat during the crop season of 1919.

The board will utilize, so far as available and necessary, the existing facilities for the purchase, transport and handling of wheat with a view to disturbing as little as possible the existing and ultimate methods of trade.

The government has been actuated in its decision by a desire to secure for the Canadian farmer the best possible price for his product and, at the same time, to ensure to the home consumer that his flour shall not cost more than is made necessary by actual world prices. Such action has also been made necessary in order to secure the early marketing and speedy movement of Canada's surplus wheat, thus making it possible for the farmer to realize at once a substantial cash prize for his wheat, and ultimately the fullest possible return of the balance of price realized by the season's sales.

The establishment of this board does not interfere with the work of the board of grain supervisors in respect of that portion of the crop of 1918 delivered by Aug. 15. Their powers and functions are continued in full force so far as that crop is concerned. The new board will have sole authority to deal with the crop of 1919, and with that portion of the crop of 1918 which will be undelivered by August 15.
