THE NOTOBIOUS LIEUT. HORKIBK IN TROUBLE AGAIN.

(Patriot, 8th inst.) Lieut, F. S. Hobkirk, the French cavalry officer, who has been confined in the county jail all summer for debt, etc., was released last night, as his last weekly allowance had no been paid. During the night he proceeded on to North Wiltshire, where he boarded the train this morning for Summerside. On the train this morning for Summerside. On the train he was met by Officer Cameron, who had been sent after him with a warrant for his arrest on the charge of obtaining money under false pretences. He was escorted back to the city and brought before the stipendiary magistrate this morning for trial. Messrs. A. A. McLean and Hector McDonald appeared for J.J. Davies, the prosecutor, and Mr. Blanchard for the prisoner.

Mr. Davies testified that the prisoner, who had been boarding at his hotel, had asked him for his bill on the night of Thursday, April 22ad. The bill which amounted to about \$47 was given to him, and the prisoner then asked for \$100 in cash, and offered his check for \$147, saying that he had money in the Bank of Nova Scotia and that the check would be cashed if presented on Saturday, the day before being Good Friday. Mr. Davies accepted the check, thinking that it would be all right, as the prisoner had given him \$140 in Bank of N. S. notes sometime before. The check was refused payment when presented on Saturday. Mr. Davies went to the cashier, who said that there were no funds at Hobkirk's credit, and advised him to call again Monday. On Monday and at other times following he received the same answer, "No funds." On Good Friday, the morning after giving the cheque, the prisoner went te Halifax, and remained for a few days. Oa his return he was asked why the cheque was refused, and he replied that his funds were in Halifax. He then made out two cheques for \$1.000 each on the Bank of N. The cheques were returned unpaid.
