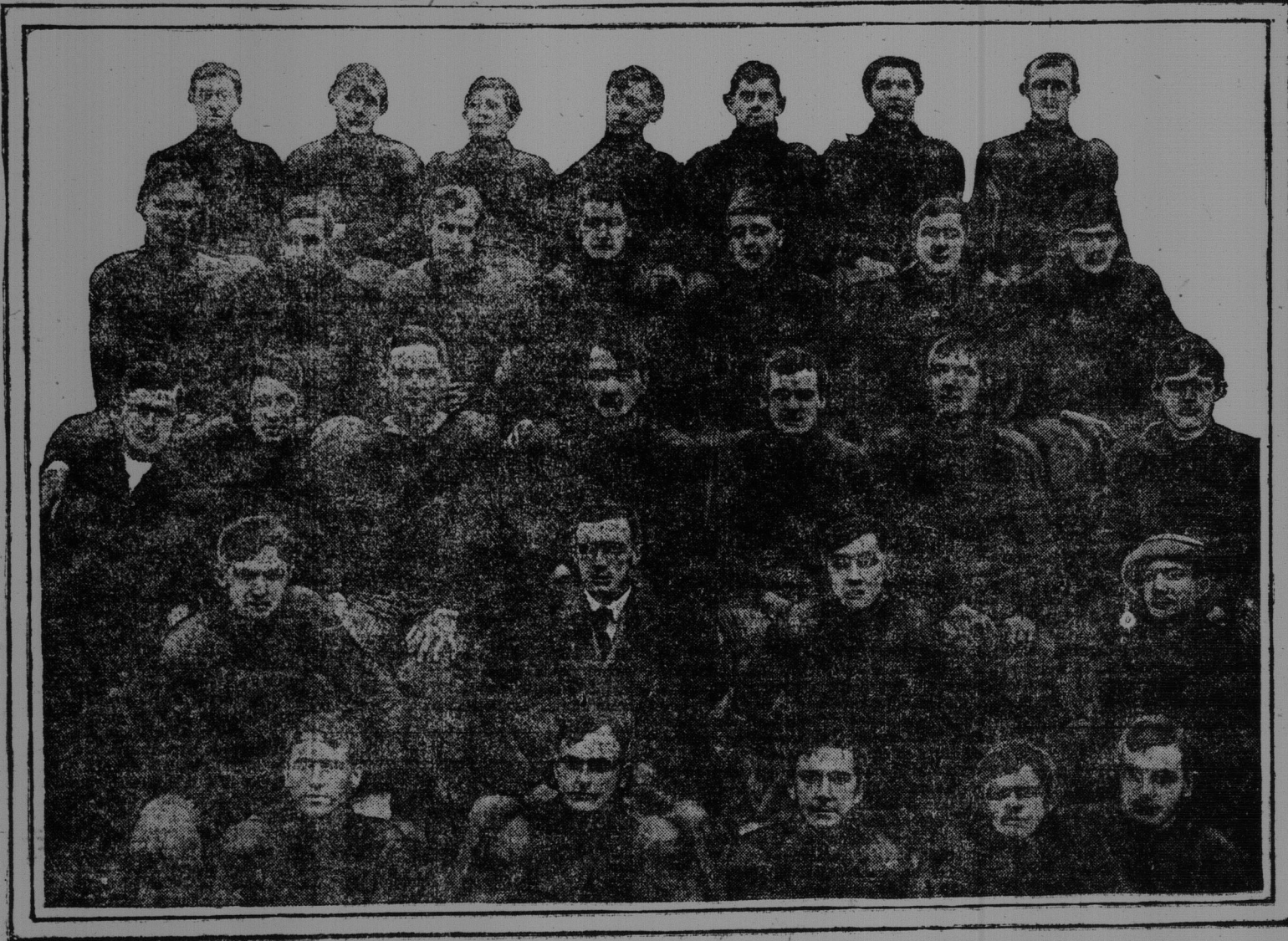


THE DICKINSON COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYERS
