

MONCTON BOXING PREVENTED

Mike (Twin) Sullivan, Beth McLeod and a number of others who went to Moncton yesterday had their trip for nothing. It was thought that all arrangements had been completed in Moncton for a bout between Sullivan and McLeod in the afternoon, but yesterday morning when the boxers arrived in the railway town they learned that those interested in the bout in Moncton had not obtained permission from the Mayor to hold the bout, and Chief of Police Rideout refused to allow the bout to take place unless the Mayor gave a permit. The Mayor was not in town, and as permit could not be obtained the bout had to be called off and a large number of sports were disappointed.

It was the intention of the boxers to have given a first class exhibition of the boxing art with no intention of breaking the laws, but the chief could not see it in that light and positively refused to allow it unless permission was obtained from the Mayor.

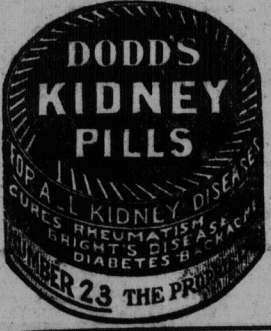
For roughness, however, the proposed boxing bout would have been in it with a wrestling bout which was pulled off in the Grand Theatre during the afternoon, and which there appears to be no law to prevent. Bull Montana and Kilonis were the principals. These two men have been wrestling each other in Nova Scotia, and appeared in the railway town to gather in some easy money. The bout was decidedly rough as far as the Bull was concerned, and some of the wrestling followers in Moncton said after the match, that it was the roughest bout that had ever been put on in Moncton.

The first fall was obtained in 53 minutes by the Bull in three minutes, and the third fall was made by Kilonis in 23 minutes.

M'CARTHY USED PALZER FOR PUNCHING BAG AND PUT HIM OUT AFTER BATTLE ROYAL

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 1.—Luther McCarthy, of Springfield, Missouri, shattered the heavyweight championship ambitions of Al Palzer, the Iowa giant at the arena today. For nearly eight rounds he used the huge frame of the Iowa man as a punching bag.

The middle of the 18th round found Palzer staggering blindly about under a volley of lefts to his battered face, and when Referee Charles Eytan walked between the men and hoisted the right hand of the smiling cowboy pugilist, the decision was received with cheers.

McCarthy's victory, following his decisive defeat three weeks ago of Jim Flynn, places him at the top of the list of white heavyweights.

McCarthy has announced and reiterated the statement today that he would never fight a negro.

Palzer in spite of his superior height, weight and reach was no match for the coolheaded, agile youngster.

He literally stumbled through the fight, assimilating awful punishment, and his reaches were wholly ineffective.

McCarthy entered the ring at 2:54 after watching the last preliminary from a ringside seat. He was followed by Palzer within a few moments.

Ringside betting appeared to favor McCarthy although offers of 10 to 8 were greedily accepted by Palzer's backers. Most of the heavy betting was at even money. Palzer's weight was announced at 227 and McCarthy's at 225.
