Although the known quotations have not advanced, we believe better prices can be expected, as holders sustain \$12 for Norwegian cod and from \$8.50 to \$9.25 per case of codfish from the United States. The market for bloaters continues weak, but the price of \$1.50 per targe box remains unchanged. "I needed an experienced catcher—and Moran was the man I wanted," said Fogel. "It cost me \$2,500 to get him when I should have secured him for \$1,500, but I was willing to pay the higher price.
