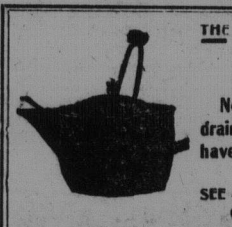

Ottawa, Dec. 1.—A change in regard to the treatment of soldiers returned from the front is announced by the military hospitals commission, which has been advised by Mr. J. W.

Borden, accountant and paymaster general of the militia department of the policy of the government. Mr. Borden states: "There are quite a number of soldiers who have been discharged at Quebec prematurely. These soldiers will be placed again on pay and allowances and will be treated exactly as if no such discharge had been given them until the medical board has again pronounced them unfit, and they are declared fit to be returned to their civil occupations, or until they have been placed on pensions."
